Graduate students taking CJ 598: International Policing, Safety and Leadership had the opportunity to spend a week in London to visit many of the agencies that provide law enforcement and security services for the United Kingdom. Criminal Justice Department faculty Dr. Lockwood and Professor Collier worked closely with Mitchell Sklar of the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police (NJSACOP) and group liaison Dave Annets to create an experience for students to meet with officials from New Scotland Yard, the US Embassy, the National Police Coordination Centre, and the National Crime Agency at Whitehall Palace, among several others. Students particularly enjoyed getting a tour of Tottenham Hotspur Stadium and its security operations by its Senior Safety Officer Eileen Williams, and also hearing from representatives the Mayor's Violence Reduction Unit, including Rhiannon Sawyer, Megan Hatton, and Arnold Yusef.

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Students in Senior Seminar Present Their Research Projects at Poster Presentation Event

On April 22, 2022, students in Dr. Lockwood and Dr. Forney's Senior Seminar courses presented their research projects at a poster presentation event in Pozycki Hall. Nearly 30 students participated in the event to show the Monmouth University community the results of their original research projects. Each student was required to develop a research methodology to test a series of research questions on a topic of their choosing, statistically test their hypotheses, and then present their findings. Students examined a wide range of important issues, including factors of terrorist radicalization, spatial components of school shootings, the impact of social media on bullying, and many others.

The projects presented by students are the culmination of a sequence of research-based courses that includes Statistics in Criminal Justice, Research Methods, and finally, Senior Seminar. Along the way, students learn about the scientific method, how to analyze data using statistical software, and how to present their results in a professional and persuasive manner.

Each year, one student receives the Pamela Markowitz Award, presented to a student in Senior Seminar who exhibits an exceptional work ethic, positive attitude, and willingness to help others. The award is given in honor of Pamela Markowitz, a beloved MU criminal justice student who passed away in 2004. The recipient of the Pamela Markowitz Award in 2022 was William John Dailey, Jr.

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ACJS selects the Department of Criminal Justice as the Recipient of its Education Award

The Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS) has selected the Department of Criminal Justice as the recipient for its 2022 Education Award. This award recognizes a "National Criminal Justice Month (March) event for its educational impact on students and the community." The Departmental event nominated, Policing in Communities of Color: A Panel Conversation on Police Violence, Black Lives Matter, and Police Reform, was described by the selection committee as "an excellent example of bringing together academics, practitioners, and students to raise awareness and increase constructive discourse regarding the challenges in addressing police-community relations, racial disparities in the criminal justice system, and policing reform. Events such as this are a benefit to your students and community." A goal of Monmouth University, and as such the Department, is to provide students with transformative learning opportunities. This panel is one example of such an opportunity, especially as the students were able to engage in critical thinking exercises after the panel, and to write reflective papers.

The Education Award includes a beautiful plaque that is now displayed in the Department. This prestigious, national award rightly recognizes the departmental effort in holding this event. However, we would be remiss if we did not acknowledge the extra hard work and effort of Dr. Marie Mele in thinking of the idea for the panel, organizing it, contacting and inviting the panelists, and working with others at the University to see the panel to realization. As many of you know, Dr. Mele has left the University, but not without first making her mark on it. We will miss her but this award will help us to remember Dr. Mele as a big proponent of challenging students, seeking change, and fighting for the underdog.

Student Internship Experiences:

Stephanie Santos Ocean County Sheriff's Office Crime Scene Investigations Unit

I was given the opportunity to intern at the Ocean County Sheriff's Office CSI Unit over the summer. As an intern, the CSI Unit introduced first-hand experiences that included participating in crime scenes, how to process evidence, using equipment, and the procedures, as well as techniques in examining crime scenes. The unit treated their interns as co-workers and prepared each intern as if we were an investigator.

I became familiar with various techniques and skills during my time spent at different incidents. I learned how to adapt, self-manage, and become team-oriented when present at different crime scenes that included suicides, domestic violence, overdoses, car thefts, and a burglary. I contributed my efforts in helping to find fingerprints, shell casings, and other valuable evidence. After applying my skills and techniques, I am now capable of identify-

ing and preserving evidence at crime scenes, can adapt to different environments, and collaborate successfully with others. An opportunity to intern at the CSI Unit is highly recommended to gain first-hand experiences with challenging crime scenes and work beside dedicated officers.

My internship at Lakewood Police Department offered me practical life experience working in law enforcement. My site supervisor was very kind to me at all times and laid out all of my scheduling ahead of time to make sure that it worked for me. There was a great level of professionalism that was carried out throughout the department, but everyone also had a great sense of humor so we always had a good laugh. The officers I had the pleasure of working with allowed me to get involved in everything they did. At no point was I ever sitting around looking for something to do, my schedule sometimes had me with two divisions in one day which kept things interesting.
