This isn't so much Christmas as a grandmother story: about the little girl who went to Sunday school for the first time. When her mother asked

her how she liked it she said it was all right, and did her mother know that the teacher was the baby Jesus' grandmother? "That's interesting," her mother replied. "And how do you know?" "Because she talks about him all the time."

**DRINKING IN COLLEGE** (Roger Strass and Selden Bacon) is a sort of Kinsey report on campus drinking. It is an analysis of the survey conducted by the Center of Alcohol Studies of Yale University, which has been working on the problem of alcohol in American society for twenty years. Questionnaires were sent to 17,000 men and women students in twenty-seven colleges throughout the country.

Like all statistical reporting, this book is not what you'd call good reading, but the conclusions are of great importance. For instance, students follow the example of their parents. Where both parents use alcohol, 92 per cent of the men students drink also, and 83 per cent of the women. Where only one parent drinks, the percentage is 83 of men, 54 of women. Where both parents abstain, it is down to 58 of men, 23 of women. Clearly parental example is an important factor in the decisions of college youth about drinking. The influence of income, religion and ethnic background is also traced. And the truth emerges that college drinking is primarily a matter of custom. It is not, as is so commonly believed, the free rational choice of

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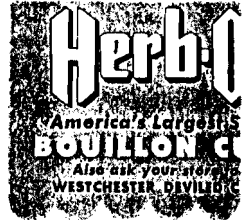
