

## Guide to the GREs – Graduate Record Examinations

#### General GRE

### Verbal Reasoning

- o There are two 30-minute sections, each containing approximately 20 questions
- o They assess the ability to understand readings and apply reasoning skills
- Includes the following types of questions:
  - Text Completion Questions
  - Reading Comprehension Questions
  - Sentence Equivalence Questions
- Scoring:
  - 130 170 score scale, in 1-point increments
  - For doctoral programs, score of 160 (previously a 600) recommended
  - For masters programs, score of 153 (previously a 500) recommended

#### Quantitative Reasoning

- o There are two 35-minute sections, each containing approximately 20 questions
- o They assess basic concepts of arithmetic, algebra, geometry, and data analysis
- o Includes an on-screen calculator and the following types of questions:
  - Multiple-choice questions
  - Numeric Entry questions
  - Quantitative Comparison questions
- o Scoring:
  - 130 170 score scale, in 1-point increments
  - For doctoral programs, score of 148 (previously a 600) recommended
  - For masters programs, score of 144 (previously a 500) recommended

#### Analytical Writing

- There is one section with 2 separately timed tasks (30 minutes each)
- Assesses critical thinking and analytical writing skills
- Goal is to articulate complex ideas clearly and effectively
- Includes 2 timed essays to write
  - Analyze an Issue: express your views on a critical issue
  - Analyze an Argument: evaluate a logical argument
- Scoring: 0 6 score scale, in half-point increments

## **Psychology GRE**

- 205 multiple-choice questions
- 3 content categories:
  - Experimental or natural science oriented (~40%)
    - learning, language, memory, thinking, sensation and perception, and physiological psychology/behavioral neuroscience
  - Social or social science oriented (~43%)
    - clinical and abnormal, lifespan development, personality, and social psychology
  - o General (~17%)
    - history of psychology, research design and statistics, applied psychology, psychometrics
