## Director's Speech from International Women's Day at Monmouth University, March $8^{\rm th}$ 2017

Welcome everyone.

My name is Dr. Corey Wrenn, I am a professor of Sociology and Director of Gender Studies here at Monmouth University.

I have been asked to welcome you here to campus and kick off the rest of our afternoon programming, and I'm certainly pleased to do so.

*So, why do we march?* 

We march for so many reasons, but mainly we march, because we care.

We care about the right to love who we love without fear.

We care about the right to express our true gender or no gender at all.

We care about the right to control our own bodies.

We care about the right to clean air, land and water.

We care about access to good health care, schools, and warm homes.

We care about freedom from violence and persecution.

We care about those who face deportation or alienation.

There's a lot to march about.



This marching is not against the current administration, although for many of us, there is an element of that, for others it is not.

This marching is about something bigger.

After all, we were marching under other administrations, too.

Occupy Wall Street marched (and camped) for a fair distribution of resources.

Native Americans marched to protect the safety of their communities and the land of their ancestors.

Animal rights activists marched to shine light on the systematic and unnecessary killing of nonhumans.

Black Lives Matter marched for right to life and safety.

They are marching still.

My primary area of research is the science of social change and collective action. As a social movement theorist, I know the power of protest is real and important.

But it doesn't take a scientist to understand that marching motivates us, brings us together, and materializes dreams.

Being here today matters.

So, united we stand. United we march.

And let's not forget those who are not able-bodied and may not be able to march or stand. Let's also not forget those who can't afford to take off work to be here today, animals trapped in feedlots and laboratories,

Those incarcerated in prisons, who are disproportionately poor and persons of color, Our elders,

...and all those who also have a stake in this world who cannot be here with us.

How about...
United we resist,
United we strive,
...and united we love.

Thank you for showing up today. Keep showing up.

I want to open the mic now for our community leaders to share their thoughts.

Thank you and congratulations on an amazing show of solidarity today on International Women's Day.





# P.U.S.H. Back Semester Kickoff Professors United for a Safe Haven

On September 6<sup>th</sup>, the Gender Studies program collaborated with allies across campus to demonstrate to our students and the wider community that we stand behind President Dimenna's recent statement emphasizing "our shared commitment to building a community of mutual caring and respect, diversity, and integrity" and to join him in "condemning hatred, bigotry, and violence in all forms [and] offering support to those who may be feeling vulnerable." #### P.U.S.H. Back Event Statement by Dr. George Gonzalez, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies



As Cornel West, the great African-American philosopher, has argued: for the tradition of radical democracy, DEMOCRACY is something which expands and grows, not something which is achieved once and for all. There as some similarities, here, with the deconstructionism of the French philosopher, Jacques Derrida, who argues that the demands of JUSTICE are always and already unmet. Despite our best efforts, there is suffering and forms of social violence and exclusion that we do not see and perhaps unwittingly reproduce. This is true for all of us. As we stand here today, the concrete demands of organizing are many and they are important. Really important. Work in the world of institutions can help us move towards that 'more

perfect union'. For example, we can do things, institutionally and locally and nationally, to try to preserve and expand the protections of DACA and more fully welcome the Americans they serve into the fold of the national fabric.

However, today I'd like to stress the importance of what some refer to as 'negative critique'. The cause of JUSTICE demands that we take a step back and consider the ways in which we might be tempted by enticing but ultimately cheap business solutions to moral problems. JUSTICE cannot be bought. The cause of JUSTICE demands that we consider the ways in which structures of racism, patriarchy, classism, homophobia, ableism, speciesism and the like don't simply exist "out there" among our political enemies---because we are historical creatures, they, in fact, have shaped all of us at the core of our being. This is to say that introspection does not represent the opposite of social justice seeking—it is its necessary complement. Our lack, our complicity and our necessary failures won't destroy us---the real danger is a narcissism which sells us the lie that we have done all we can and should and seeks to remake the world into a juvenile battleground between saints and sinners; liberators and liberated. Let's try to listen for voices from the margins (even the margins within) we might not yet be able to hear.

Biology, Senior



#### Dr. Rekha Datta to Teach and Research in India

Monmouth University Professor of Political Science Rekha Datta, Ph.D., is spending a portion of the current academic year in India as a recipient of a prestigious Fulbright-Nehru Academic and Professional Excellence Award in Teaching and Research. As a Fulbright U.S. scholar, Datta will be researching global governance, local and cultural norms and gender-based violence in India.

She is also serving as a Visiting Professor in the O.P. Jindal Global University's School of Government in Sonipat, Haryana. The university works in collaboration with the Society for



Participatory Research in Asia to implement community focused work related to domestic violence, the safety of women, and gender equality.

A noted scholar, Datta is the author of Why Alliances Endure: The United States-Pakistan Military Alliance, 1954-1971; Beyond Realism: Human Security in India and Pakistan in the 21st Century; and is co-editor, with Judith Kornberg, of Women in Developing Countries:



Assessing Strategies for Empowerment. Her scholarly interests cover foreign policy analysis, domestic politics and foreign relations in South Asia, gender and development, gender-based violence, child labor, and human security. Her work has appeared in 10 books and numerous journal articles. She is currently working on a book on contemporary India. Datta said that being selected for a Fulbright award was "a privilege and an honor." She said she is excited to delve into both the teaching and research components of her grant:

"With my deep interest and passion for teaching, especially for international and cross-cultural education, I am looking forward to engaging with students and

colleagues in India to further cultural and academic collaboration."

Fulbright awardees are selected on the basis of academic and professional achievement and service and leadership in their fields. Datta is the recipient of the Outstanding Leader in Experiential Learning Award from the National Society for Experiential Learning, Monmouth University's Distinguished Teacher and Global Visionary awards, and the Humanitarian of the Year Award from the Jersey Shore chapter of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

During her stay in India, she also plans to travel to other universities and conferences to give lectures and seminars: "We are thrilled that Dr. Datta has been chosen for this incredible Fulbright opportunity," said Provost Laura J. Moriarty, Ph.D. "Her passion and dedication to teaching and research makes her an exemplar of the type of faculty member that builds a truly transformative education for our students at Monmouth University. I am sure that her experiences as a Fulbright scholar will only enhance her teaching and scholarship when she returns to campus."

Datta's Fulbright-Nehru project, "Global Governance, Public Policy, and Culture: Role of Local NGOs in Combating Violence Against Women in Northern India," is an ethnographic study to assess global, national and local norms and policies, and how those policies develop the



capability of women to address gender-based violence and contribute to empowerment. The project focuses on northern India, but may later expand to include other areas of the country. The flagship international educational exchange program sponsored by the U.S. government, the Fulbright Program is designed to build lasting connections between the U.S. and more than 160 other countries where the program operates.

According to the United States-India Educational Foundation, the administrator of Fulbright awards in India, Datta is one of only four scholars from New Jersey — and the only one in her field of study — to be selected for the Fulbright-Nehru award this academic year. 




#### **Disability in Pop Culture**
