Gender Studies Program Meeting, Fall 2017

Last semester's open meeting began with a lively Brown Bag discussion regarding trans health based on new faculty member Sasha Canan's recent attendance at the annual trans health conference in Philadelphia. This discussion led to a brainstorming about how we might begin a "PUSH Back against the Gender Binary" campaign. This could include working to allow students to register with their preferred name, providing campus wide/department specific safe zone training, a CETL event to help professors with strategies of supporting trans students, etc.

The spring meeting is scheduled for **February 8th**, 11:30 am in Turrell Boardroom, Bey Hall.

Intersectionality Week 2017

Monmouth's LGBT student group SPECTRUM held a successful Intersectionality Week of programing in collaboration with several other student groups to celebrate connectedness, awareness, and support across cultures, genders, sexes, classes, and races! The Gender Studies group launched the week with an Indigenous People's Day tabling in the Student Center. The highlight of the week was SPECTRUM's Coming Out Day celebration, while Students Advocating for Gender Education (SAGE) hosted a wage gap bake sale which charged female customers less than male customers to highlight nationwide pay discrepancies. Youth Activists also participated by hosting an open mic on the theme of acceptance in the student center.

Eric from Project REAL attended SPECTRUM's meeting to educate students about the organization's efforts to provide HIV testing services for LGBTQ+ teens and adults.







American Sign Language Class

The Sociology Club hosted another successful ASL class in November. The featured speaker taught students some basic sign language, but also presented on the politics of disability and difference in the United States.



Mindful Halloween 2017

The Sociology Club and Youth Activists reminded students to be MINDFUL in their Halloween celebrations in an artful, creative, and professional tabling outside the student center on October 25th. Topics tackled included cultural appropriation, environmental stewardship, and substance / sexual abuse.









P.U.S.H. Back! Professors United for a Safe Haven



On September 6th, the Gender Studies program collaborated with allies across campus to demonstrate to our students and the wider community that we stand behind President Dimenna's recent statement emphasizing "our shared commitment to building a community of mutual caring and respect, diversity, and integrity" and to join him in "condemning hatred, bigotry, and violence in all forms [and] offering support to those who may be feeling vulnerable."


The event was so successful, the Gender Studies Program, in tandem with allied departments across campus, launched similar campaigns to address Monmouth's current maternity leave policy which unnecessarily excludes men and threats to undocumented students following recent political changes. We also held another event during SPECTRUM's Intersectionality Week to raise awareness to rape culture which was attended by 30 or 40 faculty members, including our Provost Moriarty.





Fall 2017 Gender Studies Praxis Projects

Last semester's SO/GS 225 Intro to Gender Studies classes under Dr. Wrenn developed over twenty community-oriented projects to creatively engage gender theory with others. Students blogged, wrote editorials for *The Outlook*, produced videos on Youtube to share across social media, lectured to school groups, invited prison justice speakers to campus, and tabled about domestic violence, women in the sciences, women in sports, and sexual assault. One group of students collected **over five boxes of school supplies** for a girls' school for disadvantaged children. Another group **collected over 100 female hygiene products for homeless women in the area**. One student who produced a Youtube video on femininity and body hair in front of Wilson Hall has reached over **10,000 views**!





P.U.S.H. Back student information flyers are available highlighting anti-oppression student organizations and majors/minors at Monmouth.


