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



MEET PRESIDENT BROWN

Paul R. Brown Takes the Helm as Monmouth University's Eighth President

A puff of white smoke at 7:07 pm on March 13, 2013, signaled a change in leadership for a crowd of thousands who gathered in Rome. Four hours and 4,295 miles away a slightly less dramatic announcement from Board Chair Robert B. Sculthorpe '63 shared the news that Paul Richard Brown was the first and unanimous choice of the Board of Trustees to lead the University as its next president following an extensive national search.

r. Brown is an outstanding leader with the qualifications to help Monmouth University continue to prosper as a strong, vibrant institution," Sculthorpe said. "We are confident that he will continue the remarkable progress that Monmouth University has experienced."

Brown began his tenure as president on August 1, after spending months in consultation with the Board of Trustees, then-President Paul Gaffney, and members of his cabinet to ensure a smooth operational transition. The hand-off between the outgoing and incumbent president was marked with a brief ceremony on the front steps of Wilson Hall on July 31.

His first three months have been a whirlwind of activity as he begins the process of crafting a comprehensive strategic review. Even in his short tenure, Brown has helped international students move in to their residence halls, hosted former New Jersey Governor Christie Todd Whitman and the first lady of the United Republic of Tanzania, Salma R. Kikwete, on campus and worked alongside President Jimmy Carter on a Habitat for Humanity project in Union Beach.

"One of the great joys and privileges of being the president of Monmouth University is the opportunity to meet with a wide array of business and cultural leaders," Brown says.

Brown's path to the top post at Monmouth includes faculty appointments at Yale University, New York University, and most recently, Lehigh University where he was the dean of the College of Business and Economics. At Lehigh, Brown



completed a transformative and wide-sweeping strategic plan over a 10-month period, which was unanimously endorsed by the faculty.

The results of his tenure at Lehigh are clear; Brown managed historically high levels of enrollment in both undergraduate and graduate programs and recruited and hired faculty at an unprecedented pace. He also raised more than \$40 million in unrestricted funds and for endowed faculty chairs.

President Brown's amiable demeanor underscores his passion for academia. He soaks in the nuances of each conversation, weighing various perspectives as he interacts with students, faculty, staff and other members of the campus community. An avid lover of opera, it isn't at all surprising



to see him sit with easy grace at the baby grand piano in Doherty House, the presidential residence named for former Board Chair Paul S. Doherty, Jr. '67 HN '04, and play Hoagy Carmichael's "Stardust," which Brown says was his mother's favorite song.

But Brown's academic inclinations and easygoing manner don't immediately suggest that he paid for his college education at nationally-ranked Franklin & Marshall, where he graduated with Phi Beta Kappa honors, as an iron ore miner, or that he is equally comfortable putting in sweat-equity on construction projects—building houses in Vermont with his family— as he is working through a complex corporate valuation model.

President Brown is a man of many accomplishments, but also many surprises, which he reveals as you get to know him better.

And Brown seems determined to meet and make personal connections with as many members of the campus community as possible, scheduling sessions with every academic and administrative department, and becoming a regular fixture at campus events, even surprising members of the men's lacrosse team during an early Sunday morning scrimmage.

A first-generation college graduate, Brown understands the transformational power of education, and the hard work-very hard and downright dangerous work in his case—that is often required for students to earn the dividends that a degree promises.

It's a fair bet to say that most summer employment for Monmouth students, past or present, did not involve working 1,200 feet underground on an overnight shift where jobs involving dynamite were the most desirable—because they paid the highest union wages.

For some perspective on Brown's student days—really nights—as a miner in the Bethlehem Steel owned Cornwall Ore Mines, imagine yourself on the top floor of the Bank of New York Tower in Manhattan, which ranks number 29 on the list of the world's tallest buildings, and turn it upside down.

From Dean to President

s the landscape of higher education becomes more focused on bottom-line results. reducing student debt, and creating job opportunities for recent graduates, Dr. Ted Marchese, senior consultant at AGB Search, and chief advisor to Monmouth University's presidential search, said that Monmouth University joins an increasing number of colleges and universities that are selecting business school deans as presidents.



"Over the last 10 years one of the trends in higher

education has been the emergence of responsibility centered management (RCM)," Marchese said. "An RCM approach requires that each school within a university take responsibility for enrollment management, budget, personnel, and capital expenditures."

Dr. Marchese, the former vice president of the American Association for Higher Education, says that unique blend of responsibilities, which is a familiar load for business school deans, makes them desirable candidates for presidential appointments.

"Today the dean of a university based business school is, in effect, the president of a medium sized college - with budgetary and major fundraising responsibility as well as knowledge of faculty recruitment, alumni affairs, online learning, outcomes assessment, accreditation and student affairs - often working with a powerful advisory board," Marchese said.

The financial acumen of a business school leader often proves invaluable as pressure mounts for colleges and universities to manage costs while facing increased scrutiny about the high cost of higher education.

In July of 2013 alone, three other business school deans were selected at top leadership posts. Michael R. Cunningham, former dean of the College of Business Administration at San Diego State University, was chosen as president of National University, Garrey Carruthers, former dean of the New Mexico State University College of Business and former governor of New Mexico, was selected to lead New Mexico State University, and Kenneth Evans, former dean of the Michael F. Price College of Business at the University of Oklahoma, was named president of Lamar University.



"The temperature was always very cool in the mines," Brown recalls. "I looked forward to the relief from the summer heat," Brown said reassuringly as I blanched at the idea of working so far underground. "The mine system was a self-contained atmosphere, with its own shops and gathering places," Brown recalled.

The mines, which operated continuously for 234 years and once contained the largest deposit of iron ore east of the Mississippi River, were permanently closed by flooding caused by Hurricane Agnes.

Based on his personal experience as a student, and expansive and successful career as an academic, it is understandable that Brown has made it very clear that his focus is on student success. which he defines broadly.

"Every student deserves a personalized educational experience, one that is tailored and operational in the context of the university the student has chosen to attend," Brown says. "The personalized experience offered by a school dominated by the performing arts, for example, is very different than one offered by a school stressing engineering, and is very different than a comprehensive private, primarily residential, university like Monmouth."

"As a comprehensive university we have the luxury of exposing the minds of all our students to the core values of a liberal arts education, as well as an array of wonderfully relevant professional fields of study," Brown says.

For Brown, the real value of an education isn't just measured by objective benchmarks. "Looking at a scorecard that includes graduation rates and employment is by no means a complete picture of accountability," Brown says.

"When students are challenged academically, when they experience interactive learning opportunities, when they enjoy quality interactions with faculty in the context of their academic work, experience collaborative research with faculty members, study other cultures, and when they take leadership roles in clubs, or in athletics — at the varsity or intramural level – they are actively engaged, and better prepared for life after Monmouth," Brown says.

But Brown also recognizes that any responsible university must educate students to a standard influenced, in part, by the employers who will hire its graduates. "As educators, it is our obligation to place before our students the right programs, the programs that have both relevance and timeliness in their fields of study and future fields of employment," he says.

PAUL BROWN: A "SUPER" GUY

How many university presidents can boast of sharing the stage at the Metropolitan Opera with Plácido Domingo? An avid fan of the opera, President Paul Brown can stake his claim to opera history, despite his admission that he "cannot sing."

Brown's appearance onstage on the opening night of Sonja Frisell's production of Verdi's Aida on September 25, 1989, came as a "super"-short for supernumerary- the term given to non-singing extras who populate crowd scenes on stage.

Landing the role of a super is still a competitive process, and many don't make the cut. Brown says it helps to have flexibility in scheduling, facial hair, and not be too tall or too wide. "Basically, supers are scenery," he said, "and they need to fit into a wide variety of costumes."

The 1989 production of Aida, filmed two weeks after opening night, is still hailed as one of the finest stagings of Verdi's masterpiece. One reviewer of the Emmy-award winning DVD said, "I would have sold my soul to have seen this one live at the Met," while another wrote, "This 1989 production has all of the elements that

historically make the Metropolitan Opera one of the world's best."

Brown, whose resume of appearances at the Met includes productions of Verdi's La Traviata, and Puccini's Tosca and La Bohème, said that working as a super was the best way to get into the opening night of new productions.

"My love of opera comes from studying German at Franklin & Marshall." Brown said. His professor, Paul Pletcher Martin, who served with Army Intelligence in London and Berlin translating war documents before launching a 32 year teaching career, was a bit of a character.

"Professor Martin would bring his bulldog to class with him, and play German opera records," Brown said. "We would translate the words to Wagner's Tannhäuser while the music played. For comic relief, we translated parts of the Guttenberg Bible," Brown recalls.



Hoping to instill a similar appreciation for opera in Monmouth University students, President Brown ran an essay contest in October inviting 10 winning students to join him at the Met: Live in HD simulcast performance of *Tosca* in Pollak Theatre on November 9.

"Opera is great entertainment, but unfortunately too many students have not been exposed to it. I thought this was a great way to pay back my own experience as a student," Brown said.

"As educators, it is our obligation to place before our students the right programs, the programs that have both relevance and timeliness in their fields of study and future fields of employment."

"Employment, graduate school, public service, and all variations of these as celebrated outcomes should keep us constantly thinking about what is best for our students," Brown says. "But we also have a profound obligation to prepare our students for 'life' while they are with us on campus," Brown says.

"That process all starts with instilling the love of learning," Brown says. "We are an institution of higher education. We are about a higher calling and about learning," he emphasizes.

"I definitely want to create leaders, not just workers," Brown told parents at freshman move-in day on September 1. "We'll do it together."


An important part of moving this process forward for students, and for Monmouth University as a whole, is bringing a more global perspective to campus. Brown notes that globalization has created an unprecedented demand for leaders who are prepared with the right blend of theory and practical experience.

Getting the balance right, Brown believes, will better prepare graduates to successfully navigate the opportunities and challenges that a more globally interconnected future will present.

Brown's own international experience is extensive, including academic appointments with the European Institute of Business Administration (INSEAD), and the

International University of Japan. He has also guest lectured at universities in China, Singapore, and Brazil.

"I have worked and lived in many parts of the world, and I know that I am a better person for it. We have an obligation to get our students out of their comfort zone to recognize that while they might be residents of New Jersey or New York or California or Pennsylvania, we are all citizens of the world," Brown says.

A corporate governance consultant and expert, Brown previously served on the board of directors of Dassault Systemes, S.A., a publicly-traded software producer and solutions provider whose stock trades on both NASDAO and the Paris Bourse. He also served on the board of directors of another software firm, Dictaphone Corporation, until the company was sold to Nuance, Inc.

As Brown settles into his new role, listening and learning from every quarter of campus, he is also preparing to lay the groundwork that will ensure continued success and growth for Monmouth.

"Strategic thinking that encompasses the entire community will help us formalize a strong and comprehensive planning process and ultimately a strategic vision that will set our priorities for the years ahead," Brown said. "I look forward to engaging the entire university in this important task, one that will set the stage for Monmouth University's success in the decades ahead." MU

YOU KNOW IT'S FAKE, RIGHT?



"You know it's fake, right?" If I had a nickel for every time I heard this phrase, I wouldn't have to explain my journey from Monmouth University to my job at World Wrestling Entertainment. Instead, I'd be swimming in a vault of gold coins like Scrooge McDuck, because most people I meet can't wrap their heads around the very real aspects of professional wrestling.

n 2012 one WWE event alone, WrestleMania 28, generated \$102.7 million for the city of Miami and Miami-Dade County, according to a study conducted by the Enigma Research Corporation. That is a pretty real economic impact.

I'm Frankie Morales, an associate producer in the International Television department at World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE). Note the keyword at the end of the company name, "Entertainment." I am in the business of creating content that pleases the masses, produces a buzz in the media, and entertains the WWE universe in more than 150 countries in 35 different languages by generating hours of programming each week.

Essentially, my job involves transforming the vast WWE video library—the very same content that mesmerized me as a child—and creating an experience that will cultivate the next "me," in a sense. My job is to cultivate a love of the glory, grandeur, and magnificence of WWE for future generations, on a global scale. Pretty cool, right?

We aren't just a company that has grown men rolling around in spandex in the middle of a ring.

Sure, that might be what some take away from it, but in my four years at WWE, I've taken part in many aspects of content creation and promotion that has made this company a global juggernaut.

I've written the stories that separate heroes from villains and that tell the legacies of legends that turn an average man or woman into an immortal character. I've produced the images that show decades in a manner of seconds, which bridge the gap between past, present and future, and tug at the heart strings of viewers across the globe. I've pushed myself to my limits, reinvented the wheel and not only thought outside the box, but I've mapped out new boxes around it, and that's just by 11:15 EST on a Monday night.

So maybe I'm taking some creative liberties here, but that's no different from what I do at WWE every day. Here, I produce several hours of television, whether it involves creating an original program such as the WWE Vintage Collection, or the repackaging of domestic content like "WWE Raw" for various international clients.

I write scripts that detail major events in WWE's history for programming that are recorded as voiceovers for future promotions, edit video packages that recap our captivating storylines, and create new video packages that reinforce our corporate efforts at community service for active duty military personnel, the Make-A-Wish Foundation, and many other worthy causes.

From the behind-the-scenes work involved in creating WWE-themed video games to producing content for YouTube, to performing as on-screen talent at WrestleMania, and working backstage at live events, I have experienced them all in my career with the WWE.

I have a real-life career—my dream job—in a corporation with global media reach that many have dismissed because it's "fake." But I wouldn't have gotten here without the very real experience that I got at Monmouth.

The Communication program gave me my start. At Hawk TV (or FrankieTV, depending who you ask), I was able to delve into every aspect of television: writing, producing, editing, on-air talent, camera operation, teleprompting, and studio management. This diverse experience gave me the groundwork I needed to succeed at WWE. Essentially, I do all the things I learned at Monmouth for the WWE every day.

It was the hands-on experience that helped me hone my skills, and it was the Monmouth atmosphere that developed my drive to be nothing short of the best. Had I gone anywhere else, I'm convinced I might still be in line to use a camera for the first time, where at Monmouth I was able to engage quickly.

The Monmouth chapter of the National Broadcast Society (NBS) introduced me to my original contact at WWE because I was able to attend an NBS convention as a student. By simply taking the material I

worked on as a student and entering into a regional competition in my junior year, I was able to network professionally right away and make a professional contact that got me in the door at WWE.

It was the resume I put together at Monmouth that invited me into the WWE Universe.

WMCX and the Outlook were other avenues that helped me grow into the producer I am today. Whether it was developing a rundown of the songs I'd play on my radio show, the topics that we would discuss, or the stories I'd write in my weekly Outlook article, I learned to find a way to keep audiences engaged.

Monmouth's learning opportunities offer a structure that allows any studentany student willing to put the time and sweat into learning—to gain the elusive experience that all recent college graduates resumes so desperately need.

Where else could I say I have experience not only producing but developing a show?

If you've ever seen Hawk TV's "Extra Point," you know that I can. Who can say they managed a group of 60 diverse

personalities to create seven original college programs? As a former Hawk TV station manager, I can.

Who can say that they've taken initiative to produce, edit and distribute independent wrestling programs just for the sake of more original programming? Well, WWE will tell you I did, it was one of the reasons they hired me, and I owe the credit to Monmouth.

I'm not the only one at WWE who owes a bit of gratitude to the training and opportunity we received at Monmouth. Irene Serrano '10, Drew Chiminec '10, and Chris Grecky '06 all turned the Monmouth "M" upside down for the "W" of WWE.

Each of my fellow Hawks who have worked at WWE was actively involved when they were students, not only the Communication program, but with their extracurricular activities. Whether they were doing radio broadcasts, producing live music television shows, voicing their directions on shows...they all pushed themselves further. Not because they had to, but because Monmouth gave them opportunity to do it. We were all able to find jobs immediately out of school, something that not most recent graduates can claim.

In my four years at WWE, I've become an associate producer—an achievement that takes many others in the media industry much longer to accomplish. In my four years at Monmouth, I did more than I could ever have dreamed of just in the Communication department alone.

You can probably imagine why I still get riled whenever someone tells me what I do is "fake." Is the entertainment I produce scripted? Absolutely. But there is nothing fake about my career or the real opportunities I had at Monmouth. MU

MONMOUTH SUPPORTS HABITAT PROJECT

President Brown, students join President Carter in Volunteer Effort

President Paul R. Brown, students, and other volunteers from the Monmouth University community picked up hammers and scampered across rooftops on October 12 as part of Habitat for Humanity International's 2013 Jimmy & **Rosalynn Carter Work Project in Union Beach,** where more than 80 percent of the town's homes were affected by flooding after superstorm Sandy ravaged the coastline last year.



"Giving back to the community helps remind us that we are not alone and that by working together we can come back after a natural disaster like superstorm Sandy," said President Brown. "The more we work together, the faster it will get done," he said.

Brown, no stranger to hands-on construction, added that Monmouth University students and employees raised money for the project through Hawk TV's "Rock 'n Relief" concert. Brown's construction experience includes roughing out and finishing several homes in Vermont with members of his family.

Assistant Professor of Communication Sheila McAllister, along with members of the University chapter of Public Relations Student Society of America, acted as a liaison to the media by posting updates on Twitter.



Sophia Nappi, a worksite volunteer and Public Relations major who will graduate in the spring, said, "Working with Habitat along with former President Carter and President Brown is a great experience. I am honored to be able to be a part of their recovery process."

For the Carters, it marked a 30-year partnership with Habitat as part of the Carter Work Project. For Monmouth University, it meant helping some of the 500 families in the seaside town who are still displaced.

"Rosalynn and I have been to a lot of places struck by natural disaster. We've been to Thailand after a tsunami, Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina, and to Haiti after the earthquake. We're looking forward to working side by side with you," President Carter said shortly after arriving at the worksite.

Sculthorpe noted that while many things about the University have changed since its founding, all of the "important things remained the same."



He said that he absolutely knows those traditional ideals will be nurtured by President Brown.

Sculthorpe spoke about the horrific aftermath of superstorm Sandy and how far Monmouth has come over the past year. He noted that the University had helped many people when it opened its doors to the Multipurpose Activity Center as a shelter for victims of the

HANLON USES ART TO INSPIRE AND EDUCATE

hether it be his depiction of basketball greats at the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame or the more contemplative monument to lost fishermen, depicting Capt. James Mears, whose boat Mandy Ness went down in the ocean in 2012, Brian Hanlon '88 looks at a piece of clay differently than most people; he brings it to life with his hands, a chisel and a vivid imagination.

Since his days as a student on the West Long Branch campus, the artist dubbed "New Jersey's Sculptor" has created more than 300 works of art, and his vigor to create more is not waning. In October he was honored for his contributions with the Distinguished Alumni of the Year Award at Founders' Day when the University celebrated its 80th anniversary in Pollak Theatre.

"This school helped change my life and the direction of my life," Hanlon said in his address He explained his nontraditional route to college at the age of 25 following a short career as an ironworker.


The subject of a 2011 short documentary, "Legacy in Bronze," Hanlon says that if the subject matter inspires him, he knows that a finished sculpture will be great. "Will a person looking at my work relate to the subject? Will they learn something from the sculpture, and maybe even be inspired?"

The inspiration for one of Hanlon's first bronze statues, a college student reading on Monmouth's campus, was Michele Adamkowski '90. The subject of the statue, "Involved Student," which still sits outside Wilson Hall in the Erlanger Gardens, later became his wife. Together they have five children.

From athletes to religious figures to 9/11 heroes, Hanlon looks for inspiration in many different venues and in turn inspires others with his creations. Still others in his collection have acted as a catharsis for grieving family members.

One of his latest is of Michael Horrocks, the 38-year-old copilot of United Airlines Flight 175 who died when terrorists hijacked the plane and crashed it into the south tower of the World Trade Center, killing all aboard. The statue, however, depicts the man in his glory days as the quarterback of the West Chester College football team.

At the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame where he is the official sculptor, he hopes to expand the knowledge



of African American influence on basketball history. He is also redesigning one of the floors of the museum into "Coaches' Circle," which will include Hall of Fame coaches like Vivian Stringer and Jim Calhoun and their many charitable endeavors off the court. And he plans to display a sculpture of Dr. James Naismith sitting on bleachers and teaching children. Naismith is known for inventing the sport of basketball in 1891 and is often credited with introducing the first football helmet.

His passion to create has taken him back to Monmouth's campus with his Hawk sculpture in 2009 that now greets guests to the Multipurpose Activity Center. From West Long Branch to as far as China to sculpt Shaquille O'Neal, Hanlon finds inspiration in every facet of life.

Hanlon's vision over the next few years includes many other projects, but Hanlon's focus is still the same. "I want to inspire and educate," said Hanlon, who added, "I don't want to just decorate the landscape."

wo of Hanlon's sculptures can be found on the Monmouth campus. The "Involved Student" (located in the Erlanger Garden behind Wilson Hall) and the Hawk sculpture (located in front of the Multipurpose Activity Center), are beloved icons. "Involved Student" was inspired by his wife, Michele Adamkowski '90, who was a "soccer stand-out" during her college career at the University.

"By far my greatest creations are my family," Hanlon said in his address. His emotional speech tugged on the heartstrings of the audience as he tearfully thanked his family for their support for a career that was risky at the outset, despite his later professional success. He also spoke about his time at the University and how he created his first sculpture in his dorm room.

"This school helped me change my life and the direction of my life," Hanlon said. Hanlon has five children. and his daughter, Maggie Hanlon, is currently enrolled as a freshman at Monmouth, and is a member of the cross country team.

Christopher, one of the nation's most visible nurse-leaders, especially as the head of the VNSNY, one of the largest not-for-profit home health care agencies in the United States, delivered the convocation address. Before Christopher was presented with her honorary degree, President Brown said that she was at the ceremony to "inspire us."

Christopher graduated from Fairfield University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing and received a Master of Science Degree in Nursing from Seton Hall University. Upon presenting Christopher with her honorary degree, Trustee Carol Stillwell said, "[You are] officially an alumnus of Monmouth University."

Christopher's speech went into depth about the history of the Monmouth University, and highlighted several notable alumni and their idealism. She shared her aspirations for the future while also appreciating the greatness of its past. She urged students and faculty to "pause and reflect on the tradition of Monmouth."

The inspiring nurse-leader lives in Avon by the Sea with her husband, George, who earned a master's degree from Monmouth in 1985, and their four children. She said that because her home is nearby and most of her career was spent in Monmouth County, she "[feels] a strong affinity to the area."

"I really just can't believe that I'm getting this honorary doctorate today, and I'm just really humbled. It means everything to me," Christopher said. During our interview, I could see how incredibly honored she was by the recognition of her achievements.

During the ceremony, one of Board Chair Sculthorpe's statements really hit home for me, for several reasons. He said, "The Monmouth story is still unfolding, and the best is yet to be written." It hit me personally, both because I am a proud Hawk and anxious to see what the future holds for Monmouth University, and because I am a senior and my story is still unfolding.

I am also crossing my fingers hoping the best is yet to come for my life and my future. It is hard to imagine what will come next after leaving my home of four years, but whether I am ready or not, that time is coming for me. Remembering when New York's professional teams called Monmouth home

Monmouth Prepares For Giant Invasion

'Monmouth Prepares for Giant Invasion," read a headline in the June 20, 1972, issue of the now defunct Red Bank Register. The article captures the excitement felt on campus and by the wider community when

training camp.

With Alex Webster still at the helm, four-time Pro Bowler Norm Snead as the quarterback, running back Ron Johnson racking up the team's first 1,000-yard season and five-time Pro Bowler and the 1972 Maxwell Award winner Brad Van Pelt on the line, the New York Giants football team practiced at then-Monmouth College in the summers of 1972 and 1973.

"The players were all around town; it was great," said Jerry Tirotta '71. "I remember Bob Tucker had a cast on one arm and was wowing the crowd with one-handed catches. Imagine that now, a player practicing with a cast," Tirotta said.

Ed Miller '63, who was among the players on Monmouth's first soccer team and later an adjunct professor at the college, also recalled the Giants' tenure on the campus. "I remember Brad Van Pelt after practice. They were all very accessible. They played on what is now the soccer field. We called it 'the swamp'."

But the Giants weren't the only ones during that time hoping to fine tune their skills on the West Long Branch campus. The New York Knicks also called Monmouth home during an overlapping period when many future greats were local fixtures. During the Knicks time at Monmouth, their lineup was one that is still touted as one of the best basketball squads of all time.

Basketball greats Walt "Clyde" Frazier, Senator Bill "Dollar Bill" Bradley '92HN, Earl "the Pearl" Monroe, Bill Cartwright, Jerry Lucas, Dave DeBusschere, Phil Jackson, Dick Barnett, Willis Reed, Ray Williams, Bernard King, Dean "the Dream" Meminger, William "Red" Holzman, and Hubie Brown were all campus regulars.


Nancy Williams, a former Monmouth student and employee, recalled meeting Walt Frazier for the first time while playing pool in her friend's garage on Larchwood Avenue.

"This guy pulled up in a sports car asking if he could play pool with us. I had no idea who he was, but we said 'sure.' Turned out it was Walt. He was quite a pool player and quite a nice guy."

Acting as the general liaison between the campus and the pro teams was Ermio J. "Mim" Truppa, who was the sports information director for Monmouth College for about 25 years, and responsible for the founding of the Monmouth College Invitational



Baseball Tournament. Truppa died in 2004, but his daughter, Regina (Truppa) Thoma '85, shared a treasure trove of information related to his campus work with the Giants and the Knicks.

he June 25, 1972, issue of *The Star Ledger* quoted Truppa saying that men, women and children were all enthusiastic about the Giants' arrival. "This will give a lot of people who can't buy a ticket to a Giant game and have never seen a pro football team up close a chance to see the players."

Thoma, who lived with her family across the street from campus on Marvin Drive, said, "I was there every day with my dad. It was an amazing experience to have them be part of the community." She recalled Walt Frazier driving his Rolls Royce and taking some of the ball boys out to lunch in the area.

"There was a lot of personal contact with them. They loved being here. I remember bringing Norm Snead to the beach, lending my car to one of the trainers and going to Kmart with Jerry Lucas. And dad remained close to

Bill Bradley and Knicks trainer Danny Whelan. Danny was at my wedding," she added.

She also recalled Willis Reed who was the Knicks' 6' 9" center. "He was a really big guy. He was a great guy, a true gentle giant. When he came down the hall to my Dad's office, I used to hide under his desk. Willis did not want me to be afraid so he would get down on the floor and get me out! I can't picture LeBron or Kobe doing that today!"

Asked why the Giants chose Monmouth over six other locations, Coach Alex Webster told the press, "The dorms are good, the food is fine, and the athletic facilities are excellent."

Webster, a former Giants star fullback and #29 in the Big Blue's "Ring of Honor" who played under Vince Lombardi and Tom Landry, was living in Sea Girt at the time. He had been named the United Press International's NFC Coach of the Year in 1970.

Webster was among the guests on July 13, 1972, when New Jersey Governor William Cahill and Monmouth College President Richard Stonesifer welcomed Giants team owner Wellington Mara and his players to the team's debut on campus. The Giants training camp had just moved from its previous location of C.W. Post College on Long Island, NY. On that hot, sunny day, the players were required to run two miles in 15 minutes or less—only two players failed to meet the challenge.

A former student and blogger on the Big Blue Interactive website recalled, "I also remember some 'old guy' was tossing beautiful 50-yard spirals on the sideline to a ball boy. The passer turned out to be Y.A. Tittle, who was


Some saw the Giants' move as a shift away from New York following the announcement earlier the same year that the franchise would be moving from Yankee Stadium in the Bronx where it had been since 1957, to a projected site in East Rutherford, NJ, in 1975.

The move to West Long Branch, a precursor to its move to the team's move to a New Jersey stadium, was met with some criticism at the time, especially by the owners of Monmouth Race Track who saw the new East Rutherford complex as a threat to its horse racing franchise.

Some of the criticism also stemmed from faithful New York fans who were still feeling the sting of betrayal from when the baseball New York Giants, and Brooklyn Dodgers, both moved to California in 1957—a tough year for New York sports. Echoes of the interstate tug-of-war still resound today.

But at Monmouth, the Giants contended, it was less about the move away from New York and more about availability and the facilities. They did not have to share the field with college players since the birth of Monmouth's football team was still 20 years in the future.

he almost 90-year old franchise put down \$25,000 worth of sod next to Alumni Memorial Gymnasium, renamed as the William T. Boylan Gymnasium in 1992, and outfitted Monmouth athletics with \$5,000 worth of equipment.

Also helping to boost revenue for the college was the \$18,000 the Giants paid to use the dormitory on Beechwood Avenue, which at the time would normally sit vacant during the summer months. Monmouth's student residence hall provided 60 rooms for the approximately 100 people from the Giants club. A suite was also provided for news reporters who stayed overnight.

The resulting media exposure helped put Monmouth College on the map and opened up opportunities for recruitment of talented athletes.

A 15-year old ball boy for the Giants in 1972, Patrick Walsh remembers the time well. "I was the luckiest kid in the world."

Walsh, whose brother and father both had longtime careers with the Giants, recalled the press being on campus every day. "I remember Marv Albert coming to training camp pretty often." He also recalled often being the barrier between the press and the players as reporters waited patiently for a chance to chat with one of the Giants in the press room on the dormitory's first floor.

One former student recalled, "I remember watching practice during those years. It was a pretty laid-back pace as I recall...that was Alex Webster's last few years as head coach. He had a restaurant down in Sea Girt, and I think his after-practice meeting schedule included plenty of 'refreshments'. The players also knew all the high spots in that area too. You could watch the players at practice from up close at Monmouth. My favorite in those days was Spider Lockhart."

"I was a student there, briefly, in 1972. I didn't visit the practices but I did kind



of stumble onto Bob Tucker one day. He was just sitting on a bench off one of the walkways around campus. Must have been during the summer orientation that year," recalled a former student, Jerry K., on the Big Blue blog site.

Another former student who also responded to a call for information about the Giants tenure at Monmouth on Big Blue Interactive's blog said, "Spider was my favorite as well. In 1970 the team doctor at the time, Dr. Walsh of Long Branch, put two screws in my ankle from my Thanksgiving Day break (broke it on an end sweep, did a spin move on the DE [defensive end], but his hat hit my thigh, and my foot just stuck in the mud."

"I remember Frazier in his platform shoes, hats and mink coats. Earl 'the Pearl' drove his two-seater Mercedes, Clyde was in his stretch Bentley, and Bradley drove a Chevy Caprice."

Phil Jackson, considered one of the greatest basketball coaches in the history of the NBA, was also a familiar face in Alumni Memorial Gymnasium. Inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2007, Jackson began his career with the Knicks in 1967, and then enjoyed the team's two championships in 1970 and 1973. He was the Chicago Bulls' head coach from 1989-1998, during which Chicago won six NBA titles. His Los Angeles Lakers won five titles from 2000 to 2010.



"It was kind of cool as on some of my return visits for recasting some Giants would be in getting treatments. My coach used to love to take me there for these, as he would get to hang out in the waiting room with them."

But on September 1, of both 1972 and 1973, to make room for another big league, the Giants packed their bags and moved from West Long Branch to their temporary location of Upsala College in East Orange until the Yankees vacated the stadium in early October. It was the mid-practice move that ultimately led to the Giants' decision to quit Monmouth for more accommodating facilities.

From the Garden to Monmouth College


nly days after the Giants tore up the turf on campus, a bevy of future NBA Hall of Famers graced the courts of Alumni Memorial Gymnasium, when the New York Knicks called Monmouth home for practice from 1971 to 1984.

Harvey Araton described the Madison Square Garden-based Knicks roster of the time as coming from 'The Garden of Eden," in his 2011 book, When the Garden Was Eden: Clyde, the Captain, Dollar Bill, and the Glory Days of the New York Knicks.

Bill Boylan, who compiled a .699 winning percentage in 20 winning seasons and six NAIA District 31 titles, was still coaching his basketball Hawks, including future Monmouth Sports Hall of Famer Ed Halicki '74, at the same facility at the same time. The namesake of the former Alumni Memorial Gymnasium, Boylan was inducted into the first Monmouth Hall of Fame in 1981.

Unlike the Giants, the Knicks did not open their practices to the public, and most of the players stayed off campus at the nearby Harbor Island Spa in Long Branch.

"It was a surreal experience for me. I had been watching them as a kid," said Raymond Klose '77 who met some of the



players in the summer when he enrolled in the grueling Canadian Fighter Pilot Fitness Program, which was a blend of calisthenics and cross country running coached by Buzz Buzzelli, who was also inducted in the Monmouth Sports Hall of Fame in 2009.

"I found myself in the locker room getting changed with some of the Knicks," Klose recalled. "Everyone was accessible; none of the players were harassed by students."

"They were extreme characters," Klose said. "I remember Frazier in his platform shoes, hats and mink coats. Earl 'the Pearl' drove his two-seater Mercedes, Clyde was in his stretch Bentley, and Bradley drove a Chevy Caprice." Klose also recalled the story of a friend being picked up by Walt Frazier while hitchhiking on Ocean Avenue.

When the Knicks arrived on campus in 1971 the team had just clinched its first title just months earlier, led by a team of greats from lesser-known basketball colleges. The Knicks went on to win their second title in 1973.

John Gilligan '81 said, "I remember meeting the Knicks while they trained in the gym, watching them practice, and meeting Walt 'Clyde' Frazier."

Wendy Boglioli, a former worldrecord holding swimmer who won the 1976 Olympic Gold and Bronze medals, recalled the Saturday morning practices run by Coach Richard Steadman for members of the swimming team, and how they would see members of the New York Knicks while practicing.

"You would see Earl the Pearl. You saw Walt Frazier, Bill Bradley," she said. "Over here you were exposed to a lot, which I thought was very unique for a small school. I loved it." Boglioli was herself inducted into the Monmouth University Sports Hall of Fame in 2008.

The era of the Giants and Knicks playing on the Shadow Lawn campus has come to a close, but they remain a special time in Monmouth history—a time that most agree could likely never be repeated today, in part because of the full-time demands on facilities associated with a 21-sport Division I athletics program.

The mutual respect between students and professional athletes permeated the halls of Alumni Memorial Gymnasium and stretched beyond the campus into the local community, a time that still evokes passionate recollections of hosting, and watching professional greatness on home turf. MU

DUAL DEGREE VETERINARY PROGRAM

onmouth University has joined forces with St. George's University in Grenada, West Indies, to introduce combined BS/ MD and BS/DVM degrees. Students admitted to this combined degree program complete their undergraduate degree in Biology or Health Sciences at Monmouth in four years, and upon meeting established admission criteria, progress into St. George's University School of Medicine or School of Veterinary Medicine.

Qualified medical students will be eligible to complete the first two years of study in Grenada and the final two years of this combined program in clinical rotations at affiliated hospitals in the United States or the United Kingdom.

Qualified veterinary students will be eligible to complete the first three years of veterinary study in Grenada and their final clinical year at affiliated veterinary schools in the United States, Canada, Australia or Ireland.



SUICIDE PREVENTION GRANT PUT INTO ACTION

ver the past year Monmouth University has been putting a grant of \$300,000 in Garrett Lee Smith (GLS) Memorial Act funds to use to foster stronger suicide prevention programs. The grant allowed Dr. Michelle Scott of the School of Social Work and Dr. Franca Mancini '69 of Counseling and Psychological Services to train nearly 700 community members in suicide prevention, 130 of whom were outside clinicians.

Through the Promoting Wellness & Resiliency on Campus (PWR) initiative, Monmouth offered 39 training sessions in suicide awareness, identification and referral to key adult gatekeepers on campus including food service workers, facilities management, associate vice presidents, deans and department chairs and their staff, athletics, faculty, and





advisors. Student leaders included peer mentors from residential life, honors athletics. Student Activities Board, Student Government Association and Greek Life. Front line gatekeepers included approximately 180 campus police, residential life coordinators, and

the Center for Student Success, including disabilities services and first-year advisors.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention suicide was the third leading cause of death for both 12- to 18-, and 19- to 25-year-olds in the United States from 1999 to 2006.

SENATE PROCLAMATION FOR DIG

six-week archeological dig of the White Hill Mansion in Fieldsboro led by Dr. Richard Veit and Michael Gall '01 '05M earned wide media attention and a proclamation from State Senator Diane B. Allen on June 1. The project involved undergraduate and graduate students from Monmouth University, members of the New Jersey Archeological Society, and a number of volunteers.

The excavation of the storied property near the banks of the Delaware River uncovered a variety of artifacts ranging from fire-cracked rocks-evidence of ancient Native American campfires, to lead musket balls and pottery fragments. During the Revolutionary War, the mansion was used by the British as a storage depot and served as the headquarters for Hessian mercenary Colonel Carl von Donop.

Team leaders on the project included adjunct professors Sean McHugh '01 '09M and Dr. Adam Heinrich aided by alumni Tabitha Hilliard '13M, and Eric Lauenstein '11. A previous dig, in 2011, yielded 5,000 artifacts, while the more recent dig uncovered an exponentially larger trove. Once cataloged, the artifacts will be returned to the nonprofit Friends of White Hill Mansion for safekeeping.

Despite the success of the project, Dr. Veit said there is no guarantee that Monmouth University will continue working at the site, which is listed on the New Jersey Register of Historic Places. The 2013 dig was almost canceled until a private benefactor stepped in to cover lost state funding.

Other universities earning the designation included Columbia University, Cornell University, Emory University, New York University, Tulane University, and Yale University.

"To have acquired national recognition truly acknowledges the work that we do and Monmouth's commitment, not only to academic excellence, but also to student wellness," said Dr. Franca Mancini '69, director of Counseling & Psychological Services.



NEW LOOK FOR WEBSITE

Following a year of redesign, Monmouth University launched its new website in September in an effort to make it more user-friendly, incorporate more modern features and make it accessible via mobile and tablet devices.

Under the guidance of Dr. Robert Mc Caig, vice president for Enrollment Management, the Office of Enrollment Publications and Communications managed the site redesign. The previous site, which was launched in 2006, was followed by slight modifications in 2010. It also now integrates the University's expanding social media presence. The site contains more than 5,000 pages overseen by 211 content managers across campus who are charged with keeping their information fresh and relevant for our visitors.

HEALTH AGREEMENT WITH RUTGERS

onmouth University has signed an articulation agreement with Lthe Rutgers School of Health Related Professions (SHRP), formerly the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey SHRP, to allow eligible Monmouth students to enter the Master's program in Clinical Trial Sciences at Rutgers SHRP.

The program will include four years of undergraduate education at Monmouth University followed by two to three years of education leading to an MS degree. The specialized track in Clinical Trial Sciences teaches the knowledge and skills necessary to become a clinical research associate or clinical research coordinator.

"Because of the complexities of the regulatory processes required for Food and Drug Administration review and approval of new drugs and medical devices, clinical trial professionals are in high-demand in the biopharmaceutical industry in NJ and across the country," said School of Science Dean Dr. Michael Palladino.

Dr. Julie O'Sullivan Maillet, interim dean of Rutgers SHRP, added, "We are excited for Monmouth students to be able to take one or two courses on-line with SHRP while undergraduates, and then possibly decide to become clinical research professionals. It is a great opportunity for both schools."

NTCA AWARDS FOR BOWLING

he National Ten Pin Coaches Association (NTCA) recognized the women's bowling team for their academic accomplishments as a group, earning a Team GPA award. Three Hawks also earned individual academic honors from the NTCA, as junior Lauren Frankowski joined freshmen Mariah Jacobson and Rebekah Varin in being named Honorable Mention All-NTCA.

"I am very proud of these young ladies and the level of hard work and dedication they display both in the classroom and on the lanes," said Head Coach Karen Grygiel.

Monmouth finished with a team GPA of 3.25 to qualify as one of 23 institutions nationally with a Team GPA above 3.2 for their work in the classroom during the 2012-2013 academic year.

A total of 164 student-athletes from 34 schools were named to the NTCA Academic Honor Roll. In order to receive honors, student-athletes had to achieve a 3.4 GPA during this past academic year. This past season, Frankowski had a frame average of 17.07 while Jacobson and Varin posted frame averages of 17.04 and 16.73 respectively.

"I am looking forward to being a part of the Monmouth Athletics family again," said DeKalb. "I am excited to start working with the student-athletes and help them achieve their goals on and off the golf course."



NCAA AWARD FOR TENNIS

Tor the eighth consecutive season, the women's tennis team has been lauded with the NCAA Public Recognition Award, highlighting the program's exceptional academic performance. The tennis squad is one of only 61 institutions across the nation that has been honored in each of the last eight seasons.

"I am honored and proud that the women's tennis team has been recognized with this prestigious award," said Head Coach Patrice Murray '82 '89M, who has been at the helm for the past 28 seasons. "The NCAA Public Recognition Award is a testament to the type of studentathlete we have on the tennis team and at Monmouth University."

Every Division I sports team calculates its Academic Progress Rate (APR) each academic year, based on the eligibility, graduation and retention of each scholarship student-athlete. Rates are based on the past four years' performance.

Murray added, "Monmouth's administration sets the parameters and provides the guidance and structure for all of our student-athletes to strive to be the best they can be. Successful academic progress is a top priority at Monmouth."

In the 2012-13 academic year, six tennis athletes were added to the Monmouth Dean's List, including Dana Ferrari and Sarah Turner, who each posted a 4.0 GPA this past spring, while Alyssa Teehan joined Ferrari on the Chi Alpha Sigma National Athlete Honor Society.

WOMEN'S SOCCER ARE MAAC CHAMPIONS



women's soccer team ended its first season in Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) in dominant fashion on November 4, claiming the tournament while riding a 14-game unbeaten streak. The Hawks had already claimed the regular season championship on October 26. With the victory over Fairfield University at the ESPN Wide World of Sports complex in Florida, the team advances to the NCAA Tournament, for the first time since 2009, and the third time overall.

MAAC Coach of the Year Krissy Turner said, "This was a terrific team victory for Monmouth Women's Soccer. The effort, teamwork and passion the players displayed was fantastic. I am very proud of this group of young women for an outstanding performance in our first ever MAAC Tournament. We look forward to representing the MAAC in the NCAA Tournament."

The team's streak in the MAAC tied the program-record with its 17th win and broke the school record for shutouts in a season with 16 during its MAAC Championship Game triumph.

Individual players earned four of the league's five major awards while 10 Hawks earned all-conference honors. Six Hawks were selected to the All-MAAC First Team, two were named to the All-MAAC Second Team, and two were chosen All-MAAC Rookie Team members. Senior forward Dana Costello was named Offensive Player of the Year, fifth-year senior Ashley Lewis was named Goalkeeper of the Year-and Tournament MVP, and freshman forward Alexis McTamney earned the Rookie of the Year accolade, while head coach Krissy Turner was honored as the Coach of the Year.

ACADEMIC HONORS FOR TRACK

⊀he men's and women's track and field teams were honored for their academic work by the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA). Four Hawks received individual honors, and both the men's and women's squads earned team awards.

"It is very important to us that our team excels academically. We are proud of the success that both the women's and the men's teams had this year. They were strong in the classroom and excelled competitively in the conference and on a national level this year," said Head Coach Joe Compagni.

Both the men's and women's track and field teams were named as All-Academic teams, earning that distinction as a result of earning a cumulative team GPA of 3.00 or higher. The women, who earned a 3.2 team GPA in 2012-13, have made the list for 14 consecutive years. The men totaled a 3.0 team GPA this past year and have ranked each of the last four years.

Monmouth was one of five schools that will compete in the MAAC in 2013-14 to receive team honors, joining Manhattan, Iona, and Rider on both the men's and women's sides and Quinnipiac on the women's side.

Four Hawks were named USTFCCCA's All-Academic Track and Field team, as recently graduated thrower Symmone Fisher, rising junior thrower Taylor Johnson and rising senior thrower Rachel Aliotta represented the women. Senior thrower Kevin Gilhuly was listed on the men's side.

SUPREME COURT AWARD FOR WISNIEWSKI

aniel J. Wisniewski '08, an associate with the law firm of Greehan, Taves, Pandak & Stoner, PLLC, was honored in June at the U.S. Supreme Court by Associate Justice Samuel Alito for winning the Supreme

Court Historical Society's Hughes-Gossett Award, presented annually for the best student paper submitted to the Journal of Supreme Court History.

Justice Alito presented Wisniewski with a small piece of marble from the United States Supreme Court building.

Wisnewski wrote his article, "Heating Up a Case Gone Cold: Revisiting the Charges of Bribery and Official Misconduct Made Against Supreme Court Justice Robert Cooper Grier in 1854-55," as a student at the George Mason School of Law where he served as managing editor of The Journal of Law, Economics & Policy.

Wisniewski's research, which will be published in the Journal of Supreme Court History, uses two newly discovered letters from Supreme Court Justice Robert Cooper Grier (sitting 1846-1870) to Hendrick B. Wright to corroborate some of the charges leveled against him and to suggest that Grier had a heavy hand in the preparation of his own exoneration.

BAKER IS SCIENCE LEADER

eborah Ann Baker '00, chief of staff of the PMA-234 Naval Air Systems Command, received Women of Color Magazine's Managerial Leadership-Government award in October at the 18th Annual Women of Color Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Conference in Dallas, TX.

The event drew a crowd of about 250 people and raised almost \$5,000. Tom DeBlass '04, owner of Ocean County Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu, was the Anti-Bullying Prevention & Self Defense Keynote Speaker at the event. Also supporting the event were Giants Defensive End Justin Trattou and Flex Lewis, who was Mr. Olympia in 2012.

"After I read about the girl who jumped off the George Washington Bridge on her 21st birthday, I realized I needed to do something," Adamo said. Although she has always participated in charity efforts, Adamo said she felt compelled to become more active to prevent bullying.

According to the 2011 National Youth Risk Behavior Survey, one in six U.S. high school students were bullied through e-mail, chat rooms, instant

WINDOWS INTO MEN'S SOULS: RELIGIOUS NONCONFORMITY IN TUDOR AND EARLY STUART ENGLAND

Kenneth L. Campbell, Ph.D. (2012, Lexington Books, \$65.00)

Windows into Men's Souls explores early modern English nonconformity beginning with the decision of Henry VIII to break with the Roman Church in the early 1520s and continuing to the outbreak of the civil wars that devastated the British Isles in the early 1640s. Using the works of John Robinson, Thomas Helwys and John Smyth, the book examines primary works and historical development of various groups and individuals as examples of a general impulse toward religious nonconformity. During the 16th and early 17th centuries, religious nonconformity became an integral part of English culture and society, shaped by a historical experience that led to rebellion and civil war. The issues that English thinkers wrestled with during this period led to profound insights on both Christianity and on religious toleration that continue to shape Anglo-American and Western religious culture to the present day.

Kenneth Campbell, recipient of the Distinguished Teacher Award in 1995, specializes in English history. He is also the author of The Intellectual Struggle of the English Papists in the Seventeenth Century (1986) and Western Civilization: A Global and Comparative Approach, Volume I: To 1715 and Volume II: Since 1600.



Working off the disorder called obsessive-compulsive personality disorder, Impossible to Please is a manual for dealing with these difficult people without sitting through stressful arguments, vicious insults and attacks, and passive-aggressive behavior. It empowers readers to take charge of the relationship and regain their dignity and confidence in interactions with these individuals. This book features effective strategies when conversing with critical people and explains how readers can respond to unfair blame without becoming angry or overly defensive. By setting boundaries, improving communication, and asserting themselves, readers learn to deal with the impossible to please in romantic relationships, friendships, family, and work relationships.

HUME'S LABYRINTH: A SEARCH FOR THE SELF

Alan Schwerin, Ph.D. (2012, Cambridge Scholars Publishing, \$75.99)

Hume's Labyrinth explores Scottish philosopher David Hume's (1711 –1776) views on the self and his critical reservations on an account of the self that would subsequently become highly influential in the philosophy of mind. Central to Hume's Labyrinth is the suggestion that a careful analysis of the appendix to Hume's Treatise of Human Nature throws an invaluable light on a number of elements fundamental to Hume's views on the self, not least of which is the role of Berkeley's views on language.

Alan Schwerin is an associate professor of Philosophy. He completed his doctorate on Hume at Rice University and has a number of publications in the history of modern philosophy. He is the current president of The Bertrand Russell Society.



HANDBOOK OF FINITE STATE BASED MODELS AND APPLICATIONS

Jiacun Wang, Ph.D. (2012, Chapman and Hall/CRC, \$99.95)

Handbook of Finite State Based Models and Applications provides a complete collection of introductory materials on finite state theories, algorithms and the latest domain applications. The book first introduces the fundamentals of automata theory, including regular expressions, as well as widely used automata, such as transducers, tree automata, quantum automata, and timed automata. It then presents algorithms for the minimization and incremental construction of finite automata and describes Esterel, an automata-based synchronous programming language for embedded system software development. Moving on to applications, the book explores regular path queries on graph-structured data, timed automata in model checking security protocols, pattern matching, compiler design, and XML processing. It also covers other finite state-based modeling approaches and applications, including Petri nets, statecharts, temporal logic, and UML state machine diagrams.



Using hands-on case studies, Working for Justice is a pragmatic guide that documents the efforts of the Prison Communication, Activism, Research, and Education collective (PCARE) to put democracy into practice by merging prison education and activism. Through life-changing programs in 12 states (Arizona, Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, Virginia, and Wisconsin), PCARE works with prisoners, in prisons and in communities to reclaim justice from the prison-industrial complex. The book offers a broad inventory of how communities and individuals both within and outside of prisons are marshaling the arts, education, and activism to reduce crime and enhance citizenship.



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
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
