# **RAMPONE** CONTINUES STREAK OF SUCCESS



CHRISTIE RAMPONE '99 HN '05, who will be inducted along with Derek Jeter and Dick Vitale into the Sports category of the New Jersey Hall of Fame on October 8, shepherded her team to a World Cup with a decisive 5-2 win over Japan in July. The victory marked another milestone in a storied career with the U.S. Women's Soccer team, where Rampone has served as captain since 2008.

Rampone, the only player on the squad that remains from the 1999 World Cup Championship team, and most capped active player in the world, graced the front cover of the July 20 issue of *Sports Illustrated*. To honor the entire squad, *Sports Illustrated* developed 25 customized covers in place of a single group shot.

The website, Fusion, named Rampone's cover as one of the top five, noting, "There are so many possible interpretations for long-time veteran Christine Rampone's trophy cradle. It could be a subtle shout to motherhood, generally, or to her two children. Perhaps soccer is one of Rampone's metaphorical children."

A three-time Olympic gold medalist and two-time FIFA Women's World Cup champion, Rampone has never finished lower than third place in any of the World Cup or Olympic tournaments in which she has competed. >>





long the way she has quietly led and mentored the many women who have followed in her footsteps while also notching personal milestones including the births of daughters, Rylie (2005) and Reece (2010), and a prolonged battle against the chronic fatigue of Lyme disease, which she was diagnosed with in 2010.

In 2012 she also teamed up with Jersey Mike's Subs as its first spokesperson in the company's 56-year history. In that role, Rampone worked on creating an instructional soccer video series for children, teaching important soccer skills including dribbling, shooting and shielding. That partnership was renewed for another three years this past June.

"Christie is an excellent role model for our brand," said Peter Cancro, Jersey Mike's founder and CEO and recipient of Monmouth University's 2014 Distinguished Business Leader Award.

"She has strong Jersey Shore roots and shares our same values related to leadership, mentoring and giving back. Continuing our partnership with Christie was an easy decision, and we look forward to growing our relationship as we approach our 60<sup>th</sup> year in business."

Accolades for Rampone and the U.S. Women's Soccer team included a historic ticker-tape parade and City Hall ceremony in New York City on July 10, marking the first time a women's sports team was honored with a ride down the city's famed Canyon of Heroes.

Monmouth University also marked the triumph of the three-sport standout who was a two-time Player of the Year (1995 and 1996) during her collegiate career with billboards in New Jersey and extensive media placements along the parade route.

Closer to home, Rampone was lauded as a local hero on July 28 at Jersey Shore University Medical Center in Neptune, where she is a spokesperson for Meridian Health's K. Hovnanian Children's Hospital.

The celebration included a performance of the national anthem by Jacquie Lee, the Colts Neck teen who was a finalist on "The Voice." She was also joined by Lt. Gov. Kim Guadagno, New York Giants Hall of Famer Harry Carson, and Monmouth Athletic Director Marilyn McNeil.

Inducted into the Monmouth University Sports Hall of Fame in 2007, Rampone holds the Hawks' all-time scoring record with 212 points, on 79 goals and 54 assists. A four-year member of the basketball team, she remains tied with Michelle Cappadona '02 for the steals record at Monmouth.

Rampone continues her professional career as a defender with Sky Blue FC, playing home matches at Yurcak Field in Piscataway.

## FROM ACCOUNTING TO ANTHRAX:

# the FBI Adventures of Don Kleber

It's a fair bet that for most accounting majors, post-college plans don't including busting Hells Angels drug rings, jumping aboard moving ships in international waters in the dead of night, leading tactical S.W.A.T. teams, or bringing high ranking mafia criminals and terrorist bombers to face justice.

ormer basketball team captain and Phi Kappa Psi brother Don Kleber '74, has followed a career path that often placed him in direct danger, and attracted the media spotlight, including numerous articles in *Time* magazine and, more recently, appearances on the National Geographic Channel's *Breakout*, and the Investigation Discovery Channel's shows *Web of Lies*, and *My Dirty Little Secret*.

During his three decade career as a Special Agent for the FBI in New York, Connecticut and Virginia, the physically imposing 6'5" Kleber has accumulated a host of distinguished law enforcement honors and enough edge-of-your-seat stories to fill several books.

Now the founder and president of Blue Hawk Investigations in Fairfield, CT, Kleber reflected on his colorful career.


"It was a dream job," said Kleber. "That was all I ever wanted to do."

Among the stories that Kleber can discuss are the capture of 1993 World Trade Center bomber Mahmud Abouhalima, and his escort duties for former Gambino crime family underboss turned FBI informant, Salvatore "Sammy the Bull" Gravano.

But there are still a lot of stories Kleber can't disclose.

Following anthrax attacks in the aftermath of 9/11, the FBI sent Kleber to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. He was a Team Leader responsible for enemy combatant interviews, first at Camp X-Ray and then Camp Delta, until April 2002.

"There was always a certain amount of truth, but in the end they all lie," said Kleber as he recalled interviewing hundreds of detainees.

#### DISCOVERING HIS PATH AT MONMOUTH

Before a career dedicated to combating domestic and international threats, Kleber was a student at Monmouth College.

While studying toward his degree in accounting, Kleber spent summers working for the New York Giants, getting paid \$3.50 an hour. He fondly recalls being chosen because of his size to help players like Pete Gogolak and Norm Sneed warm up.

"I remember Tom Blanchard used to ask me to hold the ball for him before he kicked it," he said. During the school year, he played on the basketball team, serving as captain, and lived in the old Fountains Motel near the beach.

He also joined the fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi, and was later instrumental in re-establishing the chapter on campus and in the formation of the Phi Kappa Psi NJ Beta Alumni Association and the creation of a \$50,000 endowed scholarship.

"I still remember getting a handwritten note from one of our scholarship recipients," Kleber said. "That made a huge impression on me."

It was during his freshman year that Kleber discovered his passion for the FBI. He also learned that choosing a field like accounting would increase his chances of getting chosen as an FBI agent.

After working at Johnson & Johnson in Red Bank for three years, Kleber was recruited as an agent in the summer of 1977. Only about three percent of applicants make the initial cut and even fewer actually graduate.

Following graduation from the FBI Academy in Quantico, VA, in March 1978, Kleber trained in Norfolk, VA, for three years. In October 1980, he began his career in New York City as an FBI agent.

#### **SPECIAL AGENT KLEBER**

During his tenure with the FBI, Kleber was the lead agent on some of the largest investigations in the New York and New Haven offices. He served as a member of the New York City Joint Bank Robbery Task Force and New York City Terrorist Task Force. He was also a tactical team leader for the New York Office S.W.A.T. Team.

His extensive and often colorful experiences include kidnappings, extortions, corporate product tampering, hostage rescue, theft, bank robberies, executive protection, and crisis management.

Some high-profile cases like the round-up of more than 100 Hells Angels for illegal drug dealing in 1983



and capture of the convicted 1993 World Trade Center bomber, Mahmud Abohalima, landed his photo on the pages of magazines like *Time*.

Several years later as the country remained shaken by the events of 9/11, Kleber stepped in to run a command post at the Hilton Hotel on 42<sup>nd</sup> Street for 70 days.

"It was trying," Kleber recalled, shaking his head in silence.

This intense, emotionally-draining duty was quickly followed up by the unexpected anthrax investigations, brought on by mysterious mailings of the lethal substance for several weeks following the 9/11 attacks to members of the news media and Senator Charles Grassley and Rep. Rush Holt HN '14.

The FBI later reported the investigations were "one of the largest and most complex in the history of law enforcement."

Following the anthrax investigation, Kleber continued to crack one case after another, and eventually retired in 2006 with no regrets.

"It was the best job. It gave me the opportunity to serve this country, protect citizens and make my dad proud," Kleber said. Fast-forward a generation, and Kleber's 27-year old son, Matt, following in the same proud tradition, is now working for the FBI as a supervisor.

Kleber's wife, Julianne, is a retired teacher—a career, Kleber said, that would have been his second choice had his opportunity with the FBI not materialized.

#### **PHI KAPPA PSI AND SERVICE**

Commitment seems to come naturally to Kleber. He has been a faithful brother to the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity for more than 40 years. Along with his longtime friends, Joe Keip '75, Joe Cook '76 and Billy McLaughlin '75, Kleber has helped build the fraternity's foundation on campus, which is now represented by about 350 alumni.

"Don and I met at a Fraternity Rush Party in 1972 and pledged together," recalled his fraternity brother Keip.

"It was during that time that we found out rather quickly the only thing we didn't have in common was our size. You see, he's a bit taller than me, but we share the same enthusiasm for Phi Psi, have a strong work ethic, believe in ourselves, care for people, enjoy helping out, stay persistent, have strong opinions and most importantly, like to have fun!" As part of Kleber's continuing commitment to service, he has ridden his bicycle from East Hanover, NJ, to Washington, DC, for the past seven years each May as part of the national Police Unity Tour, to honor fallen police officers. At the end of the journey, which now includes nearly two thousand riders nationwide, the police officers commemorate the event with a candlelight vigil.

"You have made a difference in the lives of several families who have lost a loved one," Kleber wrote on his fundraising page.

Perhaps it's no surprise that Kleber's favorite book is Shel Silverstein's iconic children's book *The Giving Tree*.

#### **KLEBER HITS THE LOTTERY**

Following his retirement as a special agent, Kleber accepted a governorappointed position as Unit Chief of Security and Licensing for the State of Connecticut's Division of Special Revenue, a role he filled until 2013.

He was responsible for insuring the integrity of all legal gaming in Connecticut and conducting duediligence investigations on all individuals and businesses who participate in Connecticut's gaming industry.

During this time, he also headed the FBI Academy. Kleber is a FBI-certified police instructor and has guest-lectured at the FBI Academy in Quantico, VA, Westchester County New York Police Academy, Connecticut Police Academy, Monmouth University, Iona College, Fairfield University and Dubai, UAE Police Academy.

#### FROM THE FBI TO PRIVATE EYE

Kleber's second retirement also proved to be short-lived.

"I needed a challenge," said Kleber, who added, "I wanted to be my own boss.

In January 2014, Kleber founded Blue Hawk Investigations in Fairfield, CT, and began offering corporate and legal investigative services throughout New York and Connecticut.

From witness interviews to litigation support to executive protection, Kleber now applies his knowledge and experience to the private sector. And apparently he is just as effective.

"Donald Kleber is one of the finest law-enforcement agents it was my privilege to work with," said Andrew McCarthy, former chief assistant U.S. attorney, Southern District of New York.

"He is a superb investigator, with the eyes and ears for detail that come only with experience, McCarthy wrote. "Whether it is a shaken crime victim in distress, a shady record-keeper cooking the books or a hardened criminal plotting his next move, Don knows what tack to take and how to advance the investigation with competence, firmness and sensitivity."

Another client, former chief of police

in Fairfield, Dave Peck, said, "I have known and worked with Don Kleber for over 20 years. As an FBI Agent, Don was our local contact at the Bridgeport, CT, FBI office, and he was instrumental in assisting the Fairfield Police Department with many complex investigations and in particular a hostage situation at Fairfield University that resulted in a positive outcome due in part to his hands on assistance at the scene of the incident."

#### **TV DISCOVERS KLEBER**

Kleber's extensive career as an investigator also included less flashy, but even more grisly experiences with criminal activity.

One of his cases was first profiled on television by the National Geographic Channel in the October 12, 2013, episode of *Breakont*, "The Connecticut Conspiracy." Kleber recalls his involvement in the case surrounding Ronald Rutan who was put in prison for a string of burglaries and possession of drugs. Rutan's actions led to a 19 year sentence in a maximum security prison in Connecticut.

The premiere of his second show was televised on February 18, 2015, on the Investigation Discovery Channel's show, *Web of Lies*. The show's episode, "Too Fast, Too Young," chronicled the investigation into the murder of Christina "IT WAS THE BEST JOB. IT GAVE ME THE OPPORTUNITY TO SERVE THIS COUNTRY, PROTECT CITIZENS AND MAKE MY DAD PROUD."

Long, a teenager from Danbury, CT, who met someone online who later murdered her in 2001.

In April, he was a guest on Investigation Discovery's show, *My Dirty Little Secret*, where he discussed a case of a woman who was murdered in California in the episode, "Don't Mess with Mommy."

"The twist in the case is that the woman worked for the CIA," said Kleber.

One might think that a career spent bearing witness to such horrific scenes would have hardened him or made him cynical. But Kleber has remained steadfast to embracing his duty to serve and protect with compassion, honesty, perseverance and humility.

He continues to mentor members of the Fairfield University basketball team, often inviting them over for dinner with his family and encouraging them to make smart and responsible life choices.

"Sometimes I feel like Forest Gump," Kleber said with a smile. "The reality of my life has far exceeded any expectations I ever had."





During their journey, the squad played four games against two Chinese professional teams, winning the final three contests. Along the way, the student-athletes were immersed in an exciting cultural experience, vastly different than that of their familiar stomping grounds in West Long Branch.

Shanghai marked the first stop on the tour with a pair of games in two packed arenas played against the Shanghai Sharks of the Chinese Basketball Association.

Following a pregame ceremony that included a dance team, a speech, and words from the Shanghai captain, Zhang Zhoaxu, the Hawks first faced off against the Sharks at the Donghui School. Shanghai defeated Monmouth 72-62 in what would turn out to be Monmouth's only loss of the trip.

"I thought our kids really tried hard even though they had heavy legs from all the traveling and walking they had been doing," said Head Coach King Rice following the game. "The international game is hard to get used to when you first start, but overall I thought our kids played extremely well."

Monmouth rebounded the next day to win the second game against the same Shanghai team by a 17-point margin in front of a standing room crowd at Fudan University, one of the most prestigious schools in Shanghai.

Rising junior Collin Stewart led Monmouth with 14 points. The Hawks wowed the crowd with a handful of late slam dunks to seal the victory. In attendance on the Sharks bench was former NBA center and owner/president of the Shanghai Sharks, Yao Ming.

Between games, the student-athletes took advantage of the unique attractions of Shanghai, including a visit to the world's highest observatory at the Shanghai World Financial Center. The viewing deck is located over 100 floors above the street and features a glass floor, allowing spectacular views of the city and beyond.

"We are really, really high up," said sophomore forward Greg Nowak while atop the observatory. "I don't know how they built this thing but it is awesome."

After traveling to Hefi on the 200-mile-per-hour bullet train, the Hawks arrived at Hefei Arena to take on the Anhui Wenyi Basketball Club on consecutive afternoons. Monmouth won a shootout in the third game of the trip and the first in Hefei, 111-101 behind 24 points on 12-13 shooting from rising junior Chris Brady. The Hawks posted 10 dunks on the afternoon while winning their second straight game in China. Looking to move to 3-1 and close out the competitive leg of the trip with a winning record, the Blue and White did just that in a 106-95 win in their final game in Hefei. Stewart knocked in six three-pointers as the Hawks bested Anhui Wenyi again to end the trip with a trio of victories.

"You always want to win," said Coach Rice. "But the thing I liked most is all of us bonding together as a group and getting tighter as the games went on."

Rising junior point guard Justin Robinson echoed Coach Rice, saying "As a result of this trip, the team has become closer and we got a lot closer with the coaches as well. To come to another county with my second family and to notch up three wins is huge."

With the basketball competition wrapped up, the next stop for the team was Xi'an, which included visits to the Da Yan Pagoda, and the burial pits of the Terracotta Warriors—said by some to be the eighth wonder of the world.

"I think it's amazing," said guard Josh James while viewing the statues. "To think that farmers were trying to dig a well and instead found all these warriors is really, really cool."

The group wrapped up their trip with a flight to Hong Kong, ready to head westward for home.

Head Coach King Rice noted, "Between the competitive, international basketball matches, the cultural education, and the ability to come together both as a team, and with the coaching staff, during these two weeks has been a powerful bonding experience. This opportunity will help move the team forward." **M**

#### MONMOUTH MOURNS SAMBOL


President Paul R. Brown marked the passing of Trustee Emeritus Richard Sambol HN '04 on Saturday, May 23, with a message to the campus community. "Mr. Sambol was a tremendously influential and effective trustee, serving with distinction since his election to the Board in 1988," Brown said.

Sambol served for many years as the chair of the Committee on Trustees, as a member of the University's Government Relations Committee and the Kislak Real Estate Institute's Advisory Council. In 2004 he received the Distinguished Business Leaders Award and an honorary Doctor of Public Service degree at the spring Commencement Ceremony. In 2008 he was elected as a Trustee Emeritus by his fellow board members.

Mr. Sambol and his family have made many important contributions to education in New Jersey. The Sambols helped establish and nurture the Ocean County College Foundation. He was also a trustee emeritus of the foundation and co-initiated the development of what is now called the Sambol-Citta Arboretum.

In 1995 Brookdale Community College honored Mr. Sambol and his wife, Janice, for a lifetime of community service for Holocaust studies. They were also recipients of the State of Israel Peace Medal in 1999. In 2001 Mr. Sambol was honored with the Francis Albert Sinatra Tribute to the Performing Arts, which recognizes individuals, corporations, and philanthropies that have shown a dedication to improving cultural life in New Jersey. Mr. Sambol was appointed by President George Bush in 2003 to serve as council member for the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum.

In addition to his many educational affiliations, Sambol is a former director of the New Jersey Resources Corporation, a founder of Metedeconk Golf Club, and served as a commissioner of the New



Jersey Highway Authority and a trustee of Paul Kimball Medical Center.

A veteran of World War II, Sambol served in the U.S. Navy, and earned his bachelor's degree from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute following his discharge.

Following an 18-year career at The Pennsylvania State University's Altoona College, Womack brings a reputation in the study of contemporary literary and popular culture and nearly 25 years of experience in the classroom and in broader outreach initiatives.

Before moving into that leadership post, he served Penn State Altoona as head of the Division of Arts and Humanities for 6 years, during which time he shared in the development of new degree programs in Communications, History, and Visual Art Studies. Womack was a faculty member in the English department from 1997 to 2002.


Womack also brings considerable experience as an administrator, supervising more than 200 full-time faculty members, hiring a diverse pool of new faculty members through national searches, overseeing tenure and promotion, directing curricula, and managing the programmatic activities associated with a wide range of academic disciplines.

Womack's body of work includes three novels, John Doe No. 2 and the Dreamland Motel (2010), The Restaurant at the End of the World (2012), and Playing the Angel (2013). He is also the author or editor of numerous works of nonfiction, including Long and Winding Roads: The Evolving Artistry of the Beatles (2007) and The Cambridge Companion to the Beatles (2009).

His most recent Beatles-related work, The Beatles Encyclopedia: Everything Fab Four, was honored in Foreword Reviews' annual INDIEFAB Book of the Year Awards for the best indie books of 2014.

He is also the editor of Interdisciplinary Literary Studies: A Journal of Criticism and Theory, published by Penn State University Press, and co-editor of the English Association's prodigious Year's Work in English Studies, published by Oxford University Press.



In addition to studying Russian language and literature at the Moscow Institute of Communications, Womack earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in English from Texas A&M University and a doctorate in English from Northern Illinois University.

#### **STEM STAMP OF APPROVAL**

onmouth University recently earned the designation of a 2015 *STEM Jobs* Approved College by Pittsburgh-based Victory Media. STEM is an acronym referring to the academic disciplines of science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

The inaugural 2015 STEM Jobs Approved Colleges list rates universities, colleges, community colleges and trade schools on their responsiveness and relevance to high demand, high growth STEM occupations. Also as a result of the designation, Monmouth was featured in the winter 2015 issue of STEM Jobs magazine.

Monmouth was among more than 1,600 schools participating in the STEM Jobs survey process. Schools were scored on publicly available data and responses to proprietary questions around three key indicators of success: STEM job alignment, STEM job placement, and diversity in a school's STEM programs.



#### **GREAT COVERAGE FOR GREAT ADVENTURE**

Work Times columnist Frank Bruni profiled one of Monmouth University's signature academic programs in his recent bestselling book, "Where You Go Is Not Who You'll Be," attracting wide attention to Psychology Professor Lisa Dinella's behavioralpsychology class that partners with Six Flags Great Adventure in Jackson, N.J.

Students in Dinella's capstone course meet weekly with animal trainers and undertake extensive field research with safari park animals.

Subtitled, "An antidote to the college admissions mania," Bruni's book debunks the "conviction among too many young people that their futures will be determined and their worth established by which schools say yes and which say no" during the admissions process.

Using success stories and case studies of graduates across a wide swath of collegiate experiences, Bruni argues



that motivated students can get an outstanding education without attending an Ivy League school; to underscore the point Bruni interviews Fortune 500 executives, Pulitzer Prize winners and MacArthur Foundation fellows who did not attend "the most exclusive schools."

"What matters in the end are a student's efforts in and out of the classroom, not the gleam of his or her diploma," Bruni notes. Dinella's class was also cited in the article "The Elite Squeeze," by Bruni which appeared in the March 30, 2015 issue of *Time* magazine and in interviews with the author on National Public Radio.

Dinella was also featured on the May 6 edition of the nationally syndicated radio program, "Academic Minute," where she spoke about her research on gendered toys.

#### **CORLISS SCHOLARSHIP FOSTERS EXCELLENCE IN JOURNALISM**

Paul Corliss has rustee distinguished established а endowed scholarship in memory of his brother, Richard, who for 35 years was a film critic for Time magazine. The fully funded \$100,000 scholarship will provide financial assistance to Monmouth University students majoring in Communication while encouraging them to aspire to reach the professional heights as Richard.

Richard Corliss joined *Time* magazine as an associate editor in 1980 and was promoted to senior writer in 1985. In the late 1960's and 1970's, he wrote about film for *The New York Times, National Review* and other publications. In 1970 he became editor of *Film Comment*, a journal devoted largely to independent films and documentaries.

Following his death, *Time* editor Nancy Gibbs wrote, "It's painful to try to find words, since Richard was such a master of them. They were his tools, his toys, to the point that it felt sometimes as though he *had* to write, like the rest of us breathe and eat and sleep. It's not clear that Richard ever slept, for the sheer expanse of his knowledge and writing defies the normal contours of professional life."

"He was a workaholic, who loved writing in the wee hours and pushed deadlines to the breaking point—but always came through with pristine prose that left his editors in awe," noted Richard Zoglin in his remembrance of Corliss in the April 24 issue of *Time*.

Corliss was also the author of several books including: "Talking Pictures" (1974), a survey and critical defense of American screenwriters; a 1994 study of "Lolita," the Stanley Kubrick adaptation of the Nabokov novel; and an illustration



of history, "Mom in the Movies: The Iconic Screen Mothers You Love and a Few You Love to Hate" (2014).

Richard received his bachelor's degree from Saint Joseph's University and a master's degree in film studies from Columbia University.

McMurray School of Humanities and Social Sciences and director of the Visiting Writers Series.

"One can hardly define the beautiful, widening mark left by Joyce Carol Oates. Months after her visit, many were still talking about her reading and also about the intimate craft discussion she hosted. Now, with her generous gift for graduate students in creative writing, Joyce's influence is truly limitless," Thomas said.

Thomas said that Oates's gift is perfectly timed to support a growing graduate program and the Joyce Carol Oates Prize will inspire and also motivate potential applicants when they consider coming to Monmouth University.

In Tawil's short story, "Spellbound," the narrator, Sally, is recognized for her talent and love for words, particularly, the order of words.

Among Oates' many honors are the National Humanities Medal awarded by President Obama in 2010, two O. Henry Prizes and two Bram Stoker Awards, the PEN/Malamud Award for Excellence in Short Fiction, World Fantasy Award, and M. L. Rosenthal Award from the National Institute of Arts and Letters. In 2012 Oates received both the Mailer Prize for Lifetime Achievement and the PEN Center USA Award for Lifetime Achievement. In March 2014 she was awarded the Poets & Writers Distinguished Lifetime Award.

#### HENNING IS NEW EDUCATION DEAN



#### ARTS ACHIEVEMENT AWARD FOR HANLON

Brian Hanlon '88, the recipient of Monmouth University's Distinguished Alumnus of the Year in 2013, was awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award for Art in Ocean County, NJ, in March.

Dubbed "New Jersey's Sculptor," Hanlon's career started with a bronze sculpture of a Holmdel town hero named Bob Riggy who died in a car accident in the mid-1980s. "Four hundred installations later, Brian is one of the most accomplished artists in the world today," his brother, Matt Hanlon said.

As the official sculptor to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, MA, Hanlon recently unveiled his Dominique Wilkins statue outside the Atlanta Hawks' Philips Arena. His statue of the Hall of Fame's founder Dr. James Naismith, sitting on bleachers and teaching children, will be dedicated in September.

The subject of a 2011 short documentary, "Legacy in Bronze," Hanlon says that if the subject matter inspires him, he knows that a finished sculpture will be great. "Will a person looking at my work relate to the subject? Will they learn something from the sculpture, and maybe even be inspired?"

One area of inspiration, an effort to expand the knowledge of African American influence on basketball history at the Hall of Fame, has led Hanlon to redesign one of the floors of the museum into "Coaches' Circle," which will celebrate the athletic achievement and charitable endeavors of Hall of Fame coaches including Vivian Stringer and Jim Calhoun.

Further south, Hanlon will be working on a statue of longtime Georgetown University basketball coach, John Thompson. Also, he has completed statues at Syracuse University of Hall of Famers Floyd Little and Ben Schwartzwalder as well as the first African American to win a Heisman Trophy, Ernie Davis, whose life was tragically cut short by leukemia at the age of 23.

The inspiration for one of Hanlon's first bronze statues, "Involved Student," was Michele Adamkowski '90. The bronze work depicting a reclining reader, standing on the western edge of Erlanger Gardens, later became his wife. Together they have five children.

From athletes to religious figures to 9/11 heroes, Hanlon looks for inspiration in many different venues and in turn inspires others with his creations. Still others in his collection have acted as a catharsis for grieving family members. His passion to create has even taken him back to Monmouth's campus with his 2009 Hawk sculpture that greets guests to the Multipurpose Activity Center. rmed with a wealth of experience in debating and law and an unwavering passion for politics, Dan Roman '15 interned at the White House during the spring semester of his senior year. Only 100 out of a total of six thousand applicants are accepted into the program. "It was an amazing experience," said Roman who worked in the Office of Presidential Personnel from January until May 5. "Everyone was on the same playing field, and it's crazy how much work gets done. They are so dedicated."

"I still remember when the president spoke to our group, and he looked me right in the eye and told us to pick an issue and fight for that." And that is exactly what Roman plans to do as he embarks on his Juris Doctorate studies at Seton Hall School of Law in August.

"Being a lawyer is really exciting to me. I remember taking a law class at Monmouth and thinking for the first time in my life, I really enjoyed the homework. They [political science professors] believe in us more than we believe in ourselves."

His debating skills were honed during his four years as a member of the Debate Hawks program, where he also served as co-captain of the team for three years.

"Dr. [Joseph] Patten is the biggest influence in my life. He has been my main source of guidance. He cared about us as people," said Roman who added that Patten urged and encouraged him to apply for the White House starting in his sophomore year.

Following his internship at the White House, Roman worked for 32BJ SEIU as part of its Summer Brigade. SEIU is the largest property service workers union in the country, representing more than 125,000 office cleaners, security officers, doormen, porters, maintenance workers, bus drivers and aides, window cleaners, school cleaners and food service workers in eight states and Washington, DC.

icki Gross '13M was promoted to assistant coach of the Iowa Energy basketball team and its NBA affiliate, the Memphis Grizzlies, in July. With her promotion, Gross becomes the only female assistant coach in the NBA Development League.

#### **NEW YORK FC GRABS ALLEN**

J. Allen '11, whose fast transition from youth soccer coach for Staten Island United to a first team regular starter with New York City FC, a professional soccer team competing in Major League Soccer (MLS), caught the attention of the *New York Post* in May.

"This is an extremely big step in my career," Allen told Kyle Schnitzer who chronicled Allen's "rise from youth coach to NYCFC underdog hero. "I'm really looking forward to the opportunity that this staff has given me, and building relationships with my new teammates," Allen said in the interview.

Allen built a solid career at Monmouth, earning NSCAA All-American second team honors in 2011, NSCAA All-American third team accolades in 2010, was selected to the All-Northeast Conference first team from 2009 through 2011, and drafted fifth overall by Chivas USA in the 2012 MLS Supplemental Draft, but opted not to sign. Instead, he spent a year in Denmark where he played 18 matches for Skive IK.

The article notes "When injuries and inconsistent play struck NYCFC

in its debut months, Allen received an invitation from head coach Jason Kreis to join the MLS expansion team for a training stint. After a few days, he was officially signed May 1.

It didn't take long for Allen to find the field after stepping in. On May 3, two days after being added to the roster, he appeared as a substitute in the 70th minute in a 3-1 loss to Seattle Sounders."

His on-field performances have moved him to the first team, and help earned his first honor in Major League Soccer, being named to the MLS Team of the Week in June for his performance in the Club's 2-0 win over Toronto FC on June 20 at BMO Field.

"I always wanted to be a part of this club in New York from the day I heard about the expansion. It's obviously everyone's dream to play close to home," Allen told Jamie Martin in a June interview with the Fansided-owned outlet *Skyscraper Blues.* "I would love to finish out my career in NY. I am just so blessed for the opportunity this staff has given me and I want to repay them with good performances week in and week out."

#### NFL MINICAMP FOR O'HARA

Patrick O'Hara '14 '15M, a former defensive end on the football team, was invited to participate in a Philadelphia Eagles rookie camp in May. O'Hara compiled a solid career at Monmouth, transitioning from a preferred walk-on, to a scholarship player, starter, and later a team captain during his last two years.

In a March 4 interview with Dan Arkans in *The Reporter*, O'Hara said, "I am speechless. It's a surreal moment. It's the team I've always wanted to play for. I'm going to do what I can to make it past this camp."

The interview also noted that O'Hara didn't put any odds on his chances of making the team. His lifelong dream has already been realized.

"I always told my parents I just wanted the opportunity," O'Hara told Arkans. "I just want the opportunity to prove myself. Now, that I've made it this far, I want to make it to next step. This is the first goal."

In an earlier NFL prospect interview with Draft Diamonds, O'Hara said he selected Monmouth University because "it felt like a family with both the players and coaches. Plus it was an opportunity to come to a program and play at the Division 1 Level and help the program grow and continue being successful. Overall, Monmouth just felt like the right place for me both in school and athletics."



#### MACDONALD TOP ASSISTANT COACH



ssistant Men's Soccer Coach Hugh MacDonald '08 was tabbed as one of 15 in the nation's top assistant coaches by College Soccer News in April. Each year, College Soccer News recognizes assistant coaches who are excelling in their field, compiling a "who's who" of assistant coaches who have gone on to head coaching positions.

"The very best are effective teachers, communicators, motivators, and recruiters. They relate well to the players they coach while maintaining their respect. Successful head coaches will be the first to emphasize the role that their assistants play in the level of success that a program achieves," noted the release from College Soccer News.

In their profile of MacDonald, College Soccer News noted, "MacDonald, who

had a stellar career as a defender at Monmouth, will begin his ninth season as an assistant coach and second as the associate head coach under [head coach Robert] McCourt's direction in 2015. #### STADIUM FUNDING AT HALFWAY MARK

A significant funding milestone for construction of a new stateof-the-art Monmouth Stadium was announced in July with just over 50 percent of external funding secured to complete the project.

The facility, a much-needed upgrade to the athletic home to more than half of all student-athletes, will provide a 4,000 seat stadium able to comfortably accommodate students, alumni, and fans in a family-friendly facility.

Plans for the new with are being reviewed by the local zoning board in the borough of West Long Branch.

Dr. Marilyn McNeil, vice president & director of Athletics, said, "I want to thank the generous donors who have already pledged support to the Stadium"

"This project will continue Monmouth's ability to compete on a national level and add value to our community as a partner able to host athletic events in a venue to match the Multipurpose Activity Center," McNeil said.

Plans for the new stadium on Kessler Field include more than 800 chair back seats, reception areas, a multimedia center, an updated press box, new concession areas, an expanded ticket office and permanent restroom facilities.

"The Monmouth Stadium will cement Monmouth's growing stature within NCAA Division I schools," said President Paul R. Brown.

"Our alumni continue to compete at the highest levels of professional play, including the NFL, Major League Soccer, and Major League Baseball. Our studentathletes have proven they have the right stuff to shine at the national level, and this facility will be a showcase for all that we hope to accomplish in the future," Brown said.

eal Sterling '15, Monmouth's all-time leader in receptions, was selected as the third pick of the Jacksonville Jaguars in the 2015 NFL Draft in May.

Sterling, a First Team All-Big South selection as a senior, wrapped up his career as the most decorated Monmouth wide receiver since Miles Austin, finishing in the top three in every Monmouth receiving record. He led the Big South in yards per catch with 16.9, while finishing second in total yardage (905), receptions per game and receiving touchdowns.

He became the school's all-time leader in receptions in Monmouth's second to last game of the year against top-ranked Coastal Carolina, where he earned his fourth 100-yard receiving performance of the season.

"I'm excited; I'm ready to show what I can do at the next level," said Sterling. "I've done everything I've had to do at this point to get here. I'm just going to go down to Jacksonville and show the team what I have."

"We are very happy for Neal and his family," said Head Coach Kevin Callahan. "He has worked very hard to put himself in this position, and I wish him continued success at the next level."

Sterling joins former tight end Jon Nalbone '08, drafted in the fifth round by the Miami Dolphins in 2009, as the only two Monmouth players to be drafted into the NFL. Monmouth currently has three other players on NFL rosters: All-Pro wideout Miles Austin of the Philadelphia Eagles, wide receiver Chris Hogan of the Buffalo Bills and cornerback Tevrin Brandon '14 of the Denver Broncos.

#### MAAC HONOR ROLL FOR GIRALDO & HOOK CHANDLER

onmouth Hall of Famers John Giraldo '96 and Cindy Hook Chandler '83 are the latest inductees in the MAAC Honor Roll, where outstanding basketball players are enshrined in "The MAAC Experience" exhibit at the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

Each member institution of the MAAC honors one male and one female from its basketball family, including players and coaches, each year. A dinner on October 17, 2015, at the Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame Court of Dreams will recognize the 2015-16 Honor Roll inductees.

John Giraldo '96, a two-time First-Team All-Northeast Conference Selection, is tied for first on Monmouth's Division I all-time scoring list with 1,749 career points, and also ranks first in steals with 260, and second with 492 career assists. He ended his four-year career with the Hawks by leading Monmouth to its first ever NEC Tournament Championship, and NCAA Tournament appearance in 1996.

Following his collegiate career, Giraldo played overseas from 1996 to 2005. The guard played in Colombia (Piratas of Bogota and Paisas of Medelllin) where he was a three-time MVP, Venezuela (Trotamundos of Valencia), Portugal (Ginasio of Figuera de Foz), Germany (Poco Izerlohn) and Argentina (Obras Sanitaria). Giraldo was inducted into the Monmouth University Athletics Hall of Fame in 2010.

Cindy Hook Chandler '83 finished her career with 1,473 points and 1,051 rebounds - the second women's player to reach the 1,000 point/1,000 rebound plateau in Monmouth history. She was named the 1983 Monmouth Female Athlete of the Year and won the Kelsey Award, which is given to the senior

student-athlete with the highest GPA. She was also a 1983 CoSIDA Academic All-American, and was a member of the New Jersey Collegiate Coaches Association All Star Team, as well as the Cosmopolitan Conference Most Valuable Player. Hook Chandler graduated cum laude in 1983 with a degree in business administration, and was inducted into the Monmouth University Athletics Hall of Fame in 2010.

Giraldo and Hook Chandler join Ron Kornegay '69, former coach Joan Martin, Walter Mischler '62 and Dorothy McCrea '73 as Monmouth inductees into the MAAC Honor Roll.

#### LAX HONORS FOR PIERCE & VANGELI

Wo women's lacrosse juniors Marial Pierce and Kristina Vangeli were awarded All-America honors by Mid-MajorLacrosse.com in July.

Vangeli, a First Team All-Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference defender, was named Third Team All-American by the website, which exclusively covers mid-major lacrosse programs. Pierce, also a First Team All-MAAC selection, was named Honorable Mention All-American at attack.

Vangeli earned her first All-America and all-league award after a dominating junior year that had found her named MAAC Defensive Player of the Week three times. She started all 18 games for



the Hawks, anchoring the conference's second best defensive unit. During the season she became Monmouth's all-time leader in draw controls with a 160+ in three years.

Pierce earned honorable mention All-American honors after leading the Hawks with a career high 50 points, including 31 goals and 19 assists as a junior. She was fourth in the league in assists per game and eighth in points per game while finishing seventh among all league players in ground balls and fifth in draw controls. Starting in all 18 games, Pierce registered at least one point in the final 17 contests of the season.

Teams were chosen based on allconference teams, conference player of the year awards and NCAA statistical leaders. The award represents all 10 Mid-Major lacrosse conferences nationwide and 35 different Mid-Major lacrosse programs.

#### NUNNALLY IS SWIMMING COACH



att Nunnally, who has coached at the Division I level for 20 years, will now lead the reintroduced men's and women's swimming programs starting this fall.

A native of Avon, Nunnally comes to Monmouth after spending 15 seasons as the head coach of the men's and women's swim teams at his alma mater, La Salle University. After a distinguished career as a student-athlete at La Salle, Nunnally returned to his alma mater in 1999 after serving five years as an assistant coach at Seton Hall University.

Nunnally, a 27-year veteran lifeguard at Bradley Beach, captured his third National Lifeguarding Championship high point award in Cape May. His previous titles were captured in San Diego (2000) and Cape May (1999). As a standout lifeguard, Nunnally has been selected to the U.S. National Team and has competed in the Lifeguarding World Championships in Germany (1992), South Africa (1996) and Sydney, Australia (2000). In 2008, he was again a member of the U.S. National Team and competed at the World Lifeguarding Championships in Italy.

The Hawks will join current full MAAC members Canisius, Fairfield, Iona, Manhattan, Marist, Niagara, Rider and Saint Peter's in offering both men's and women's swimming. Full MAAC member Siena also has a women's team, while Bryant is an associate member of the MAAC on the men's side.

Monmouth has a storied tradition of swimming excellence, featuring gold medal winners at several levels, including the Olympics. Six members of its Athletics Hall of Fame were members of the swimming program, including Coach Richard Steadman, for whom Monmouth's natatorium is named. The 1974 Monmouth men's and women's swimming teams were recently honored as teams of distinction by the Monmouth Athletics Hall of Fame for their unprecedented level of team and individual success. The men's and women's team each won NAIA & AIAW National Championships and earned seventh place finishes at the NCAA national meet.

The squad featured 16 combined All-Americans and 22 qualifiers for the National Championships. A combined 30 Monmouth swimming records were set during the 1974 season and the team would feature four future National Champions and one future Olympic Champion in 1976 gold medalist Wendy Boglioli.

#### KURT SELECTED FOR WORLD UNIVERSITY GAMES



Rhising junior point guard Helena Kurt was selected to represent her native Sweden in the 2015 World University Games from July 3-14 in Gwangju, South Korea. The "Universiade," as it is globally known, is an international sporting event organized by FISU (International University Sports Federation).

"I am so happy for Helena," said Head Coach Jenny Palmateer. I know how much it means to her to represent her country, and she's been excited about the possibility ever since she was invited to try out months ago. This is a great opportunity for her to not only represent her country, but also to grow as a basketball player on the world stage. We wish her the best and share in her excitement."

The Universiade is held every other year on odd-number years. As a multi-sport event with international participation from university students, it is the largest sporting event after the Olympics. The event is divided into the Summer Universiade and the Winter Universiade with each being held in different cities.

#### FOOTBALL ON ESPN3

Monmouth University's football team will have a record seven games broadcast on ESPN3 this season, including every home contest.

The 2015 opener against Holy Cross on September 5, along with home games against Bryant, Liberty and Presbyterian will air on ESPN3. As part of the Big South Conference television package, Monmouth's games on October 24 against Coastal Carolina and October 31 at Kennesaw State will be aired on the Big South Network as well as ESPN3.

Additionally, Monmouth's first game against an FBS opponent will air on the ESPN3 platform when the Hawks travel to Mount Pleasant, Michigan to face Central Michigan.



#### CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON FOR CAPWELL

Sophomore Dylan Capwell, in his first appearance at the USA Track and Field Championships in June, finished fourth in his heat in the 800 in the first round narrowly missing an opportunity to advance to the semifinals.

"This was a great experience race for Dylan," said Head Coach Joe Compagni. "We of course wanted to advance, but getting to race against the pros at the same venue where the Olympic Trials will be next summer was very valuable. I am sure he and Coach Tarello will be back next year even stronger."

Capwell concluded a strong sophomore campaign in which he was both an indoor and outdoor All-American, the indoor NCAA runner-up in the 800, and the MAAC Most Outstanding Track Performer in both



indoor and outdoor. Capwell joins Jon Kalnas '02 as the only three-time All-Americans in program history.

Earlier in June, Capwell finished third in his heat and 12th overall in the 800 in 1:48.14 at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships at the University of Oregon, earning Second Team All-America honors for his finish. In addition to his First Team All-America honor indoors and honorable mention honors last year in outdoor, he becomes a three-time All-American.

"Dylan ran tough and took the lead between 400 and 600 meters," said Compagni. "The pace was a bit slow through 400, and he made a nice move to get into the lead. He just got caught down the stretch and was literally one step from making the finals."

"I know Dylan is disappointed, but he absolutely has represented Monmouth very well here and all season," added Compagni.

Alumnus Ford Palmer '13 also competed at the USA Track and Field Championships, advancing to the finals in the 1500.

#### FIELD HOCKEY STILL EXCELLING



The field hockey team was represented by 11 studentathletes on the 2014 Gladiator by SGI / National Field Hockey Coaches Association National Academic Team, the organization announced in March. Seniors Trish O'Dwyer, Amanda Schoenfeld and Amanda Westerweller each earned their fourth academic honor of their careers, while the Hawks' total climbed to 85 honorees during Head Coach Carli Figlio's eight years at the helm of the program.

Joining O'Dwyer, Schoenfeld and Westerweller on the academic team were Cori Allen, Brianna Dunlap, Lauren Fried, Casey Hanna, Lauren Horner, Tanja Kloock, Rachel Konowal, and Mallory Kusakavitch. The National Academic Squad recognizes those student-athletes who have achieved a cumulative GPA of 3.30 or higher through the first semester of the 2014-15 academic year.

"I am extremely happy for our team and our student-athletes to be honored nationally for their success in the classroom," said Figlio, who was named the 2014 MAAC Coach of the Year. "Having excelled both with our studies and on the field this year is a true testament to the work ethic of our student-athletes."

Monmouth, which compiled a team GPA of 3.37 to be added as a NFHCA National Academic Team Award, completed one of the best seasons in its history claiming the MAAC Regular Season and Tournament Championship and earning the program's first trip to the NCAA Tournament.

#### **TRACK & FIELD CLAIM MAAC TITLES**

The women's and men's Track and Field teams captured their second-straight league titles at the 2015 MAAC Outdoor Track & Field Championship in May. The women's team won the meet with a score of 260.2 points. Quinnipiac University finished second with 127 points, followed closely by Rider who was third with 122 points. The men's Track and Field team won the meet with a score of 266 points. Manhattan College finished second with 181 points. In third place was Rider with 127 points.

For the men's team, Taylor Bernstein was named the Most Outstanding Performer for Field Events. He won the shot put competition with a throw of 17.85m. He also won the men's discus with a throw of 54.65m. For the women's team, Taylor Johnson was named the Most Outstanding Performer for Field Events. She broke the MAAC Championship record for women's discus throw with 51.57m, and also came in second in both the women's hammer throw (53.18m) and the women's shot put (13.22m).

Dylan Capwell earned Most Outstanding Performer for Track Events. He broke the MAAC Championship record in 800m run with a time of 1:47.24 and also broke the 4x400m relay with teammates Malcolm Chavis, John Malespina and Ben Boyd with a time of 3:12.73. Capwell was also on the winning 4x800m relay with a time of 7:39.07.

Hawks also set new MAAC records during the final day of competition including the 4x100 meter relay with Jalen Walker, Eric Kahana, Bryan Sosoo and Ahmier Dupree (41.06), and Ben Boyd in the 400m dash (47.76).




#### AWAKENING: THE EDLER CHRONICLES, VOL. 1


#### **OWNING NEW JERSEY**

Owning New Jersey offers readers a detailed story of the founding of the Garden State 350 years ago. The state's boundaries were drawn in such documents centuries ago, even if the authors never stepped foot in North America. The archives hide heroes, like the freed African Americans who fought for their right to own their piece of the state. And of course, there are the bizarre and mysterious tales, like the silk baron's castle and the assault against a 16-year-old maiden during the American Revolution.

Joe Grabas, who received a bachelor's in history in 1998, is a nationally-certified land title professional who has researched real property records in New Jersey for 30 years. He is the state's leading land title educator and former president of the New Jersey Land Title Association. He founded the Grabas Institute for Continuing Education to bring historically based research to the title, legal, real estate and insurance professions. Hidden History of New Jersey at War reveals the many contributions the state made to our nation's military history, on both battlefield and homefront. Perhaps the most crucial one-day battle of the Revolution was fought in Monmouth County, and New Jersey officers engineered the conquest of California in the Mexican War. During the Civil War, a New Jersey unit was instrumental in saving Washington, D.C., from Confederate capture. In World War II, New Jersey women flocked to war production factories and served in the armed forces, and a West Orange girl helped ferry Spitfire fighters in England. War came home to the coast in 1942 with the sinking of the SS Resor by a German submarine, but the state's citizens reacted by contributing everything they could to the war effort.

Harry Ziegler, who graduated in 1980 with a degree in English, is a former editor for *The Asbury Park Press*. He was a recipient of the 1998 Gannett Newspaper Newsroom Supervisor Recognition Award. He is also the co-author of *Asbury Park*, *NJ*: *A Brief History*.


#### CHOOSING EVIL






