Patients Perception of Colored Scrubs: A Scoping Review

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Purpose of the Scoping Review is to...

The purpose of this scoping review is to examine the association between the specific color of scrubs worn by healthcare professionals and patient's perception.

Research suggests there is an association between a physician's attire and patient confidence in them, as well as patients' ability to perceive clinician trustworthiness, intelligence, and empathy.

Association Between Patient Perception of Surgeons and Color of Scrub Attire	We examined whether scrub color is associated with the ability to be perceived as a surgeon and the perception of selected clinician character traits.	January 11, 2023 Rigorous sampling and survey question design	Across all participants, black scrubs were most commonly chosen for negative character traits while blue scrubs were most commonly chosen for positive traits.
Perception of Nurse Caring, Skills, and Knowledge Based on Appearance	The purpose of the study was to assess differences among perceptions of patients, nurses, nursing faculty, and nursing students regarding nurse caring, skill, and knowledge based on attire and level of visible body art.	November 2010 A descriptive comparative design was used	For the entire sample, the nurse wearing the solid scrub was rated significantly more skilled and knowledgeable that a nurse wearing print or T-shirt attire.
Nursing attire: Indicators of professionalism?	The purpose of this qualitative research was to explore the effect that current nursing attire has on the image of the nursing profession.	May 1st, 1999 Content analysis was performed on transcriptions from the tape-recorded responses of a purposeful sample of health care workers	Two themes emerged 1.) "I can't tell you what it is, but I know it when see it." 2.) "Total package," with role identification and competency being related themes.
